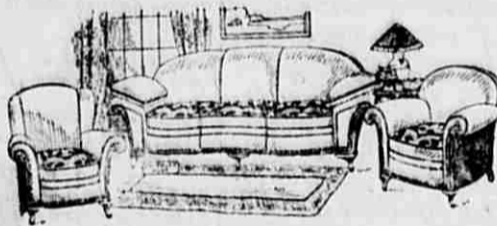

Perpetual Care Fund Cemetery Lots Proposed

The following matter is self-explanatory and will provide a method of procedure for those having burial lots in Oakwood cemetery—and their name is legion—who wish to provide for perpetual care for same when they are no longer able to attend to same in person. The great need has been for a uniform plan that all can follow; and the plan here suggested supplements one already inaugurated by the Lowell Board of Health.

FORM OF GIFT IN TRUST.
Whereas: I am interested in the township cemetery in the village of Lowell, Michigan, known as Oakwood and in lot number _____ therein, and in the upkeep of said cemetery, and to that end desire to provide for the perpetual care of such lot;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the foregoing and pursuant to the statute providing therefor, I do hereby give the sum of _____ dollars to the township board of health of the township of Lowell, Kent county, Michigan, and its successors, in trust, for the following purposes, namely:

First: To deposit and keep upon deposit in the _____ State bank of Lowell, Michigan, and its successor, either in separate deposit account or upon separate certificate or deposit, " earmarked " for identification and a " trust " at current bank rates of interest upon time deposits.

Second: To collect and receive the interest and income thereof, annually and use the net interest or income so far as necessary or so far as it will extend, in the repair, caring for and upkeep of said lot and the watering thereof.

Third: To preserve and keep intact and whole the principal of said fund, and in so doing, in case said bank shall discontinue, or if it or its successor in the judgment of said trustee (or a majority of said board) shall be or become an unsatisfactory depository, then to deposit said fund on the like terms and trusts in any sound bank in said village or otherwise in any county; or in lieu thereof to invest and keep invested in good, safe, interest bearing securities, legal for savings bank in Michigan, and use the net interest and income thereof as aforesaid.

Fourth: If at any time those buried in said lot shall be removed, either to another lot or cemetery, the said trust shall apply and the net interest and income be used in like manner for and upon said substituted lot.

Fifth: If at the end of any five year period, there shall remain any of said interest or income after caring for said lot as aforesaid, the any sum so remaining may be used at the option of said trustee in the care and beautifying of said cemetery generally.

I give and bequeath to the Board of Health of the Township of Lowell, Kent County, Michigan, and its successor, in trust, the sum of _____ Dollars, for the perpetual care and upkeep of Lot No. _____ in Oakwood cemetery in the Village of Lowell, to be kept deposited and " earmarked " separately, in any sound bank in said Village, and in lieu thereof in said county, or to be invested in good safe, interest bearing securities legal for Savings Banks in Michigan, and the net interest and income thereof used for the purposes aforesaid.

Perpetual Care Fund Cemetery Lots Proposed

The following matter is self-explanatory and will provide a method of procedure for those having burial lots in Oakwood cemetery—and their name is legion—who wish to provide for perpetual care for same when they are no longer able to attend to same in person. The great need has been for a uniform plan that all can follow; and the plan here suggested supplements one already inaugurated by the Lowell Board of Health.

FORM OF GIFT IN TRUST.
Whereas: I am interested in the township cemetery in the village of Lowell, Michigan, known as Oakwood and in lot number _____ there, and in the upkeep of such lot and cemetery, and to that end desire to provide for the perpetual care of such lot:

Now, therefore, in consideration of the foregoing and pursuant to the statute providing therefor, I do hereby give the sum of _____ dollars to the township board of health of the township of Lowell, Kent county, Michigan, and its successors, in trust, for the following purposes, namely:

First: To deposit and keep upon deposit in the _____ State bank of Lowell, Michigan, and its successor, either in separate deposit account or upon separate certificate or deposit, "earmarked" for identification and a "trust," at current bank rates of interest upon time deposits.

Second: To collect and receive the interest and income thereof, annually and use the net interest or income so far as necessary or so far as it will extend, in the repair, caring for and upkeep of said lot and the watering thereof.

Third: To preserve and keep intact and whole the principal of said fund, and in so doing, in case said bank shall discontinue, or if it or its successor in the judgment of said trustee, (or a majority of said board,) shall be or become an unsatisfactory depository, then to deposit said fund on the like terms and trusts in any sound bank in said village or otherwise in said county; or in lieu thereof to invest and keep invested in real estate, interest bearing securities, legal for Savings bank in Michigan, and use the net interest and income thereof as aforesaid.

Fourth: If at any time those buried in said lot shall be removed, either to another lot or cemetery, the said trust shall apply and the net interest and income be used in like manner for and upon said substituted lot.

Fifth: If at the end of any five year period, there shall remain any sum of interest or income after caring for said lot as aforesaid, the any sum so remaining may be used at the option of said Trustee in the care and beautifying of said cemetery generally.

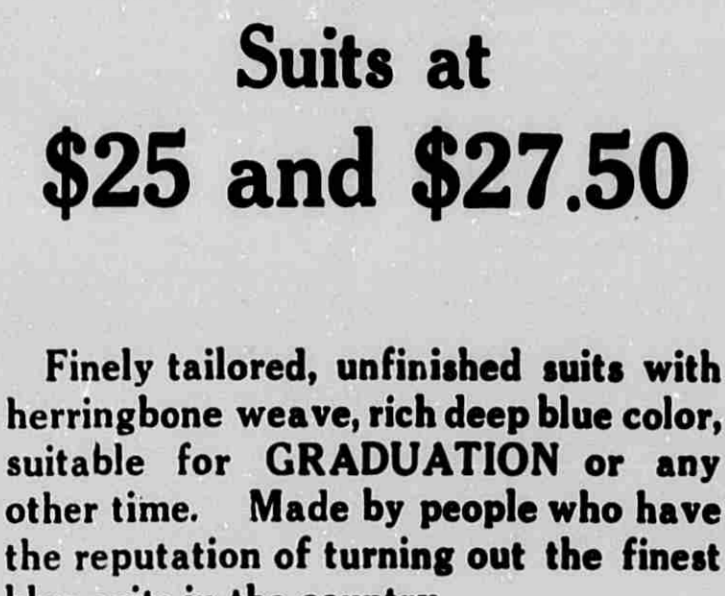
