Wm. H. Murphy Not Badly Hurt in Collision



Lowell township's well-known old citizen, William H. Murphy, was seriously injured at the oil station corner of M 16 and the Lowell road Tuesday forenoon, in an accident which it was thought at first would result fatally.

Mr. Murphy was crossing the pavement for the Lowell turn when his car was struck on the side by a Lansing car, his rear wheel taken off, and Mr. Murphy was thrown and dragged on the pavement for about twenty feet and received a bad cut over one eye and other hurts and bruises.

The Lansing driver, who was driving moderately, stopped his car quickly and rendered all the assistance possible, even taking the injured man to a Grand Rapids hospital.

Wednesday morning's Herald states Mr. Murphy's injuries proved to be slight, and the Lansing man's name is given as W. E. Blanchard.

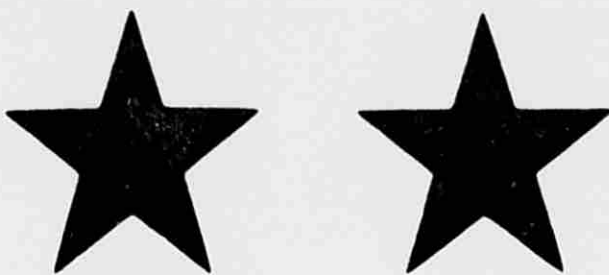

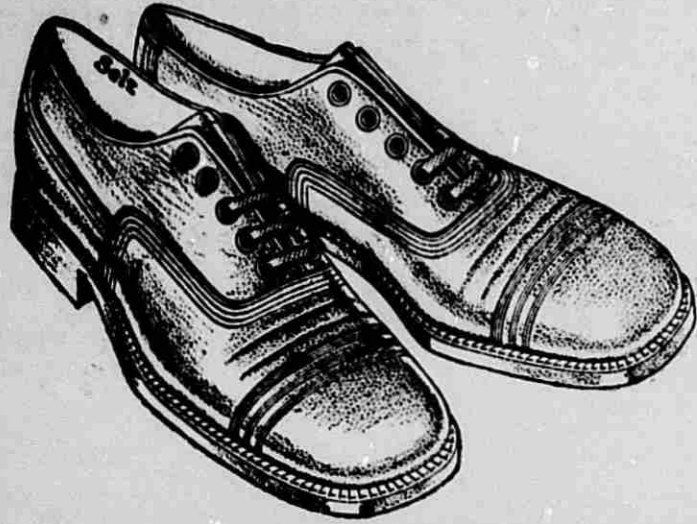
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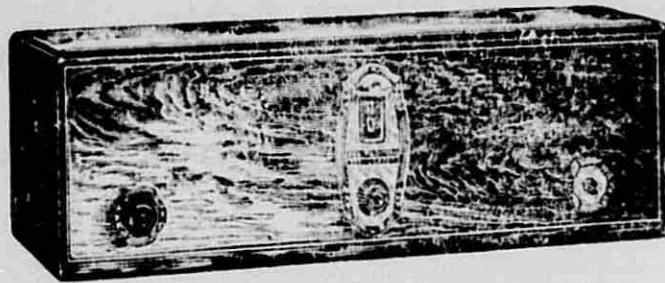
