### Fatal Crash Near South Boston Grange

Two more lives were recorded early Tuesday as a result of the crash of motor trucks Sunday night on US16 near South Boston Grange, bringing the toll of the tragedy to three.

Emily Ghareeb, 20, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nimey E. Ghareeb, 928 Alexander-st., S. E., died shortly after midnight Tuesday morning in the city hospital, from injuries she received in the collision. Her death occurred just a day after her sister, Julia, 16, had succumbed in Blodgett hospital from similar injuries received in the same accident. Mitchell Abdo, 26, of 26 Buckley-st., S. W., fiancée of Emily and driver of the truck in which the three were riding, died about 7 a. m. Tuesday, also in the city hospital. He had been injured internally and severely burned.

The group were returning from Lansing where Emily had taken the younger sister to visit relatives and was driving west in Abdo's fruit truck when it struck the rear of another truck in charge of John Chaffetz, 26, of Lansing, who had parked on the road.

Chaffetz was detained immediately after the tragic accident and was questioned by Sheriff William French, of Ionia, regarding the truck being on the highway unlighted. Chaffetz explained he was obliged to stop when the headlights went out and he was working on them when the tail-light went out. Immediately when the tail-light became extinguished, Chaffetz stepped into the truck and was about to start the vehicle and drive it from the road when the crash came.

The impact shunted Abdo's truck from the road and into a ditch. As the truck careened Julia was hurled out, while Emily and Abdo remained in it until it was overturned and burst into flames. Both were burned besides being crushed as the heavy truck tipped over. Flames destroyed the vehicle.

Ionia county authorities and Coroner H. C. Wolfe investigated the accident Monday and held that Chaffetz did everything possible, in their opinions, to remove his truck from the road. Chaffetz has been released.

The Ghareeb sisters leave, besides their parents, eight brothers and sisters: Philip, 21, who was burned severely last week when gasoline tank exploded, George, Barbara, Joseph, Frederick, Samuel and Lilian reside at home.

Double funeral services are being planned for the sisters, but definite arrangements are awaiting arrival of relatives from West Virginia. The bodies are at Lyzen's mortuary, Grand Rapids Press, May 22.

### Lowell is in State Safety Campaign

In line with the Michigan Safety Council Educational campaign as indicated by Governor Green's proclamation, printed elsewhere in this paper, Village President, O. J. Yeiter has appointed R. E. Springett and Fred Gramer to serve with himself as Safety Council committee for Lowell and has designated the W. F. Murphy and A. H. Stormanzard garages as places where free safety tests may be made of brakes, steering mechanism, lights and horns. The time for the tests is from May to June 30, and those applying to safety garages will be provided with inspection certificate stickers which will protect drivers from annoyance by Safety Inspectors elsewhere in the State.

Non-compliance with the above requirements will be penalized according to state law.

**EXECUTIVE PROCLAMATION.**  
Public safety is a foremost American problem. Saving of human life is Government's chief business. The forces of progress and of humanity in the state are seeking to check the prevailing wave of life and resources due to traffic accidents on streets and highways. There is great need of more uniform public safety, education and official administration of the traffic laws. Inter-city motor vehicle transportation tends to increase hazards in any locality unless all localities experience generally similar and equally regulated safety, education and official administration. To help affect this a state-wide traffic safety movement will be conducted during the month of May and June of this year. I sincerely believe that the people in all Michigan will give it their earnest and active support.

The question of safety in the public thoroughfares of the State is not debatable. Assurance of reasonable security to all is a public and private obligation. The state can do no more than give of its strength to such an enterprise. It is our duty to re-assert the supreme character of the law.

Government is not the responsibility of the few, but of the many—I am endeavoring to call to action, for public safety, the man-power and woman-power of the entire commonwealth. Given under my hand and the seal of the State, at the Capitol, in Lansing, this Seventeenth day of May, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-eight, and of the Commonwealth of Michigan the Ninety-second.

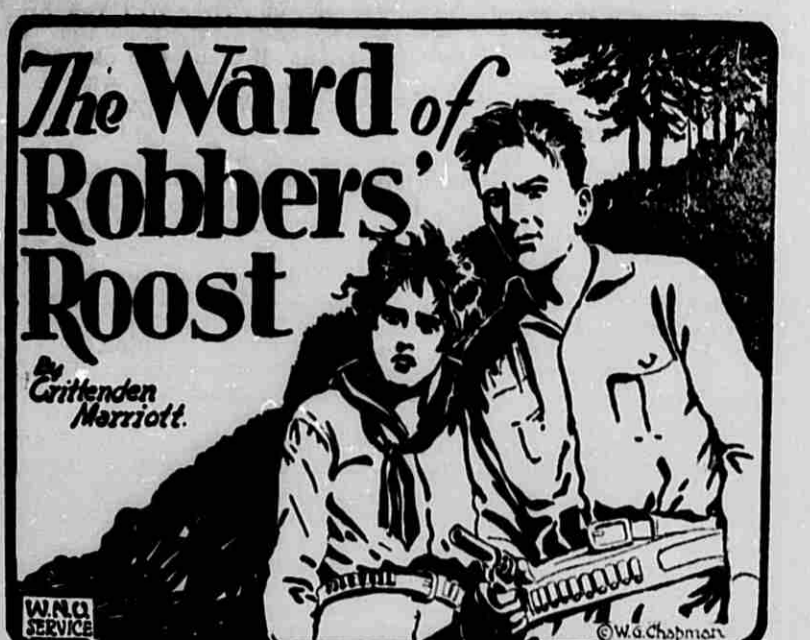

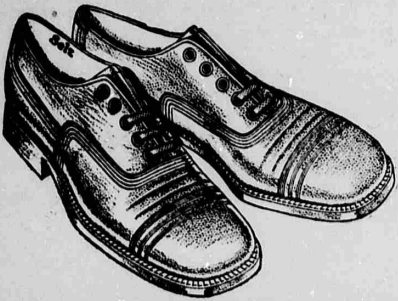

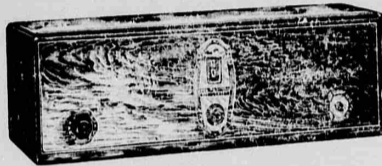
