### Ross Startles Commencement Audience

Before a packed house, Dr. Galen Starr Ross of Detroit, told the members of the graduating class of the Lowell High school some of the things they might expect to encounter when they went out into the world. The speaker did not waste a minute of the thirty that he occupied the platform. The audience was interested from the start to finish and, except for a few remarks which were unbecomingly to a commencement class, the folks pronounced their entire approval upon the oration.

**Education Not a Snap**  
The purpose of education is so to equip folks that they may go out into the world and better serve the members of society. Parents and children who expect to get an easy job because of education, should always bear in mind that the task of an educated person is a difficult one. Modern education means common sense. The course of study is fitted to the child rather than the child fitted to the course of study. Dr. Ross stressed the importance of character training in the schools. Honesty and truthfulness should be stressed even at the expense of regular academic work. Experience is a good teacher. Education and schooling are two vastly different things. The former means also a desire to learn in addition to attending a school. The boy or girl who really wants to learn will be a success out in the practical world, but the theorist or the one who has "gotten by" will meet with failure when going out into the world to tackle life's problems. In discussing religion the speaker stated that religion should be something to live by rather than something to die by.

Robert Lalley awarded the spade to Albert Butterfield and admonished the juniors to keep high the ideals of the Lowell High school. Albert accepted the trust. Both boys did very nicely. C. H.
