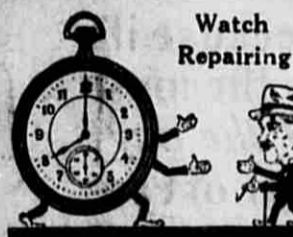

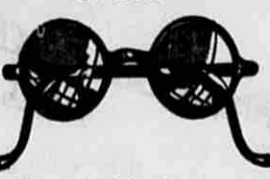

### H. VanDam is Killed in Grattan Upset

Herman VanDam, 40, of 641 Harlan-av., N. E., was injured fatally Sunday night when his automobile plunged from a road and overturned a short distance north of McCarthy's lake in Grattan township. It is believed that VanDam, died instantly from a skull fracture.

VanDam and a companion, Henry Meinke, of 1311 Portland-av., N. E., were returning from hunting grounds which they wished to visit later, when the tragedy occurred. Meinke was thrown clear of the vehicle and escaped with comparatively slight bruises. VanDam was pinned under the overturned car.

Meinke stated the road was unusually rough and the automobile struck a depression as VanDam started to turn a corner. The vehicle seemed to bounce an instant before it tipped. Meinke arose as quickly as possible and with the aid of residents nearby managed to right the car.

When the frantic workers reached VanDam they found him dead. Coroner H. C. Wolf and Deputy Ralph Bolt started an immediate investigation into the tragedy.

VanDam, who was unmarried, leaves his father, Joseph VanDam and two brothers, all residents at the Harlan-av. address.—(Grand Rapids Press, Oct. 1.)

### Burglar Robs Helpless Aged Sick Woman

Saturday night between 12 and 1 o'clock, the home of L. B. Ayers, 517 North Hudson, was robbed of about \$22. Mrs. Ayers was resting from caring for her mother, Mrs. Henry Wilson, who is ill at the Ayers home, when some one entered the house through the wash room window taking \$15.00 from Mrs. Wilson's purse, which was in the dresser drawer and \$7.00 from the purse of Mrs. Benson, of Jackson, who is helping to care for her mother. As Mrs. Ayers went into her mother's room about 1 o'clock she noticed the dresser drawer open but thought nothing of it until later when going into the dining room she saw her sister's empty purse, then began investigating and discovered the loss.

The officer thought the burglar would have searched the house through, but the light from the sick room probably frightened him away.

Very recently Mrs. Wilson Washburn heard a noise at one of her windows and upon investigating found the screen cut. She turned out the light and plainly saw one sneaking away in the dark.

Editor of The Lowell Ledger, My dear Mr. Johnson:

While at Conference I was pleased to receive a copy of last week's Ledger. I want you to know that I value very highly your good will and generous commendation of my work as expressed in your editorial of September 20. A minister's success in any community is conditioned very largely upon the friendly interest of the people in his work and their judgment concerning his ability and character. I hope that I may in some measure at least be worthy of your commendatory words.

Your statement that you have not always entirely agreed with me hurts me not in the least.
