Opening of the new M21 paved way through Lowell is in prospect for the latter part of this month possibly by Saturday, Oct. 27, when it is hoped to have with us to honor the event Governor Fred W. And there will be a general rejoicing, a parade over the new road to Neighbor Saranac, speaking and a big dinner, possibly honoring the new Riverview Inn, in which event Mr. and Mrs. Davis will find that they will have a real job on their hands.

This is all unofficial and prospective only; but we expect a complete announcement will be given in our issue of October 25. Anyhow, get ready for the big parade.

Just as we go to press we learn that the Road opening date has been set for October 30. Full details next week. Watch out.

Brown Seed Co. Rents Large Quarters Here.

The A. J. Brown & Son, Inc., have rented a part of the Peckham Furniture Company plant which the King Milling Company owns, for storage for beans and peas. Undoubtedly they will have the largest tonnage in these two commodities that they have had in the past four years.

These beans are shipped in car-load lots to various sections of the United States, and are ultimately used for garden beans. In addition to the car-load business, A. J. Brown & Son Inc., will ship several hundred orders to the smaller dealers throughout the United States. These orders will be shipped from Lowell as has been done in the past four years.

The quality of the beans grown in this section is excellent and at the present time, the Runciman Elevator is busy preparing these beans for the A. J. Brown & Son Inc.

The acreage used around Lowell for this business about 1,700 tons of peas and beans grown at Lowell and Saginaw, all of which are cleaned here, will be about a million and a half pounds. About \$40,000 will be paid to farmers here for beans of A. J. Brown & Son Inc., through the Runciman elevator.
