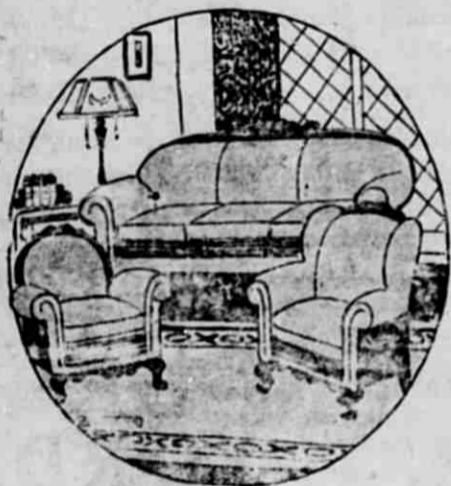

**Lowell Family of Six in Motor Crash on M-21**

Eleven people were concerned in a automobile collision Thanksgiving afternoon on M-21 about four miles west of Lowell and none were seriously hurt.

They were Mrs. Sarah Pletcher and Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Pletcher and children, all of Lowell, in one car and Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Joseph, and Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Verbert and baby, all of Grand Rapids, in the other.

The Pletcher family was coming to Lowell and the Josephs were going home.

The two cars met head-on and the Pletcher car was thrown from the road and landed wheels upon the bank, having gone through the new post and cable road guard; the Joseph car, after losing a car wheel in the crash skidded across the pavement and was stopped by the guard on that side. Mr. Pletcher kicked a hole in the top of his car, crawled out and helped the others.

That none of the numerous occupants was seriously hurt is a mystery and an occasion for congratulations.

**DEATH OF MRS. MARY COOK.**

Mrs. Mary Cook, while working in the Herold bakery Tuesday afternoon suffered a stroke, and was taken at once to Ionia community hospital, where she passed away Saturday afternoon. That same evening funeral services were held at Yeiter's chapel conducted by Rev. A. T. Cartland, of the Methodist church. Burial at Oakwood cemetery. **Life Sentence for 4th Liquor Law Violation**

Flint, Nov. 28.—"For the rest of your natural life I sentence you to Marquette prison."

Thus Circuit Judge Fred W. Brennan wrote a new chapter in the history of the state courts when he sentenced Channie Tripp, 37 years old, to the northern penitentiary for the fourth offense against the state liquor laws. Tripp was convicted yesterday by a jury that deliberated 30 minutes, and did not consider the factor of an inevitable life sentence, according to members of the panel. The court pronounced sentence today.

Tripp is said to be the first "simon pure" bootlegger to be sentenced to life imprisonment under the habitual criminal law for liquor transgressions. Other "lifters" throughout the state have had other felonies interspersed with their bootlegging activities, according to the official records.

Tripp's conscience awakened to the liquor hazard too late when he saw the sheriff's deputies drive up to his home, where his wife and her friends were making "whoopee." Tripp testified that he indignantly hurled the liquor out of the window but the glass jug did not break and the raiders confiscated the moonshine rum.

Tripp confessed that he had been home for some time before he threw the liquor out, but declared to the jury that he intended to do so from the moment he entered the house and the arrival of the deputies did not make any difference.

Three times before Tripp has heard himself convicted of liquor violations. The first time he paid a fine of \$400. The second offense brought him six months in Ionia, and the third resulted in a sojourn in Jackson prison when he chose incarceration rather than pay a fine of \$1,000. He was arrested last Summer for the last time.

Legal authorities do not anticipate an appeal to the supreme court, as Tripp's attorney was appointed for his defense by the court.—(Detroit Free Press.

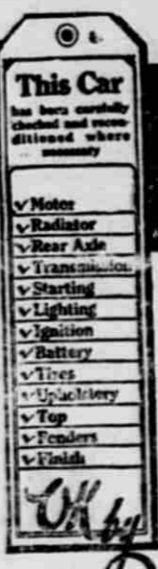
