**Supervisors'
Act Disgusts
Ate Dykstra**

Representative Ato Dykstra assails the attitude of the State Association of the Supervisors toward the proposed bill fathered by the local legislator who contends the huge gasoline tax fund should be divided equally between incorporated communities, counties and the state for highway construction and upkeep.
Mr. Dykstra protests that while the supervisors could not raise any valid argument against his bill, they turned it down and proceeded to adopt a plan whereby the townships should receive a third of the gasoline tax in the state to "scrape and patch up their township cross-roads while they joyfully agreed the cities needed nothing but the privilege of furnishing the bulk of the moneys for highways and then meet all their own obligations by a property tax."

Says Claims Are Just.
"We are frankly disgusted with this state of mind of a body of men who willfully dismiss the just claim of the large cities who pay most of the taxes, but who do not have a fair representation upon our boards of supervisors," Mr. Dykstra asserts.

Grand Rapids, for instance, pays 80 per cent of the Kent county taxes but has a minority vote on the board of supervisors. In Genesee county, this is even worse with reference to the city of Flint.
"When a public hearing was held in Lansing on house bill No. 6, for a three-way division of the way tax, a meeting which was largely advertised, there was not a single argument raised against the bill. That would have been the time for anyone being opposed to it to speak."

"Delegations were present from many cities and villages and every one attending spoke in favor of the bill. None of the supervisors attended the meeting to raise any objection, apparently because they knew the bill was based on justice and equality. They were in Lansing but ignored the public hearing."
"It seems to me the state supervisors organization is playing a rather dangerous game. As City Attorney Ganson Taggart said, those who refuse to do justice to the cities are trying to kill the goose that is laying the golden eggs."

"Wayne county alone is paying nearly one-half of all the taxes in the state of Michigan, as over and against the other 82 counties in our state. Detroit, Grand Rapids, Flint, Muskegon, Lansing, Saginaw, Ann Arbor and all the other cities which requested the passage of the bill, pay by far the bulk of the taxes in the state, both as to property and auto taxes—yet the minority, both as to population and taxpaying, tries to dictate the distribution of the more than \$42,000,000 auto taxes for its benefit, utterly regardless of the wishes and needs of the cities and villages in the state who furnish most of the tax revenue."

"Detroit alone has 31 per cent of the population of the state and every organization in Detroit which was represented in Lansing at the hearing, asked for the passage of the bill."
"We were grieved at the attitude of the state supervisors because our Kent county delegation in the house voted solid two years ago for the Turner bill which would have taken at least \$30,000 per year from our Grand Rapids taxpayers from the primary school fund in favor of the poor school districts in the state, if the supreme court had not held this to be unconstitutional."
