Mrs. Emmons' Long Illness Ends in Peace

Mrs. Maggie Emmons, many years a Lowell resident, died at the Soldiers' Home hospital Friday morning, after a long illness, aged 66 years.

The body was brought to Yeiter's chapel Friday afternoon and Rev. A. T. Cartland conducted a funeral service in the presence of a few of Mrs. Emmons' Lowell neighbors, after which the body was sent to Ubley, Mich., her former home, near Port Huron, where her husband was buried ten years ago. Funeral and burial service were held there Sunday.

Little is known here of Mrs. Emmons' life history, except that her husband was a Civil war veteran and that they came to Lowell some fifteen or twenty years ago.

She was a good woman and was highly esteemed by her neighbors, among whom she found friends, who proved themselves real friends, during her long decline and illness and who are glad for her sake that her suffering is over and that she has found the rest she longed for, as so feelingly expressed by her a few weeks ago, when told of the death of a young friend, "Oh! Why couldn't it have been me?"

St. Mary's Celebrate 50th Anniversary

It is expected that a large number of priests who were formerly in charge of the Lowell parish will be present for the ceremony and the banquet. The dinner is being given under the auspices of St. Mary's Guild, of which Mrs. R. M. Shivel is the president.

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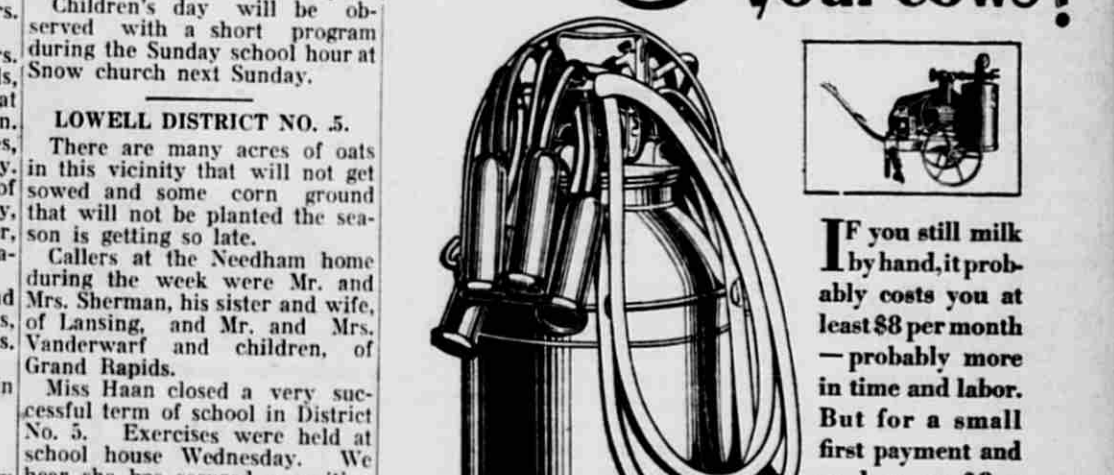

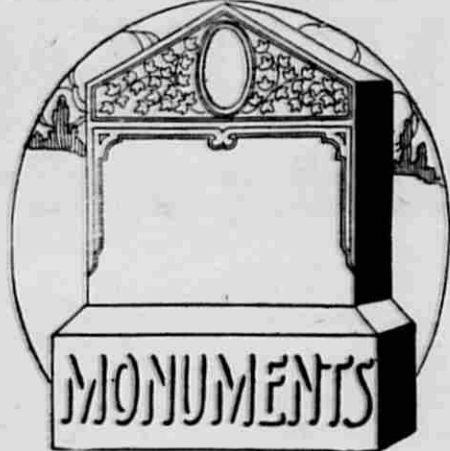
