**Former Lowell Woman Held for Murder**

Kalamazoo, July 22.—At the same hour funeral services were being held over the body of Mrs. Etta Fairchild, their victim, Eugene and Pearl Burgess, middle-aged couple, being held on a charge of first degree murder in connection with the "witchcraft" slaying, were arraigned Monday in municipal court before Justice Carl C. Blankenburg.

Through their attorney, Stephen W. Wattles, the two waived examination and were bound over to circuit court to plead next Monday.

Man and wife, absolving each other, have made declarations to city and county officers that each had beaten Mrs. Fairchild with a lead pipe a nd carpenter's hammer until she was dead. Mrs. Fairchild, an old friend of the Burgess family, was seated at the supper table, an invited guest in the home, when she was murdered. Neither of the middle-aged couple expressed remorse for the deed and both declared that "people are now safe" from Mrs. Fairchild.

Burgess declared in his unusual plea of self-defense that it was "her life or ours" and that she had threatened "to kill the entire Burgess family." To officers questioning him Mrs. Burgess declared she killed the aged woman because she feared harm would come to their 17-year-old daughter, Eugenia.

Burnett Burgess, the 27-year-old son, who is held as an accessory after the fact, was said by his father to have aided in placing the body in a cistern in the rear of their modest home. Eugenia, the daughter, who was in custody a few hours, was released Saturday.—(Grand Rapids Press.)

The Mrs. Pearl Burgess named above is said to have been a Lowell girl. Pearl Sayles, who left here many years ago and will be remembered by some of the older residents. The family lived in the brick cottage on the gravel pit hill in the north-east part of the village.

**IONIA ROAD COMMISSION PUSHING HIGHWAY WORK.**  
Ionia, July 24.—Never before have so many men been at work on Ionia county roads at one time as at present. The Ionia county road commission is pushing highway maintenance in the county to the limit. Crews numbering 150 men are engaged in the work, and this number does not include any men at work on new construction, which is several hundred more.

The Ionia Free Fair has set the pace for 14 years for other county fairs to strive for and this year the fair officials intend to establish a new peak of perfection, which ten years ago, would have been declared unachievable but which the tremendous growth and improvement of the Ionia fair has demonstrated may be reached.
