**M. D. Hoyt  
Badly Hurt by  
Falling Lumber**

While receiving lumber by railway from the car on the siding and piling same in his Lowell lumber sheds Monday about 4 p. m., M. D. Hoyt, the enterprising proprietor, was badly injured by the falling pile of timber, nearly a thousand feet of which fell upon him. Except for his assistant, Allen Morse, who was in the car and starting the lumber down the slide, he was alone when the pile crashed down upon him.

But other men about the lumber yards and a customer who had just started away with his load hastened to his rescue, lifting the lumber piece by piece to avoid another slide and crush. Mr. Hoyt was covered out of sight.

As soon as possible he was uncovered and Dr. Godfredsen, who had been called, gave him first aid, and he was removed in Yeiter's ambulance to Blodgett hospital, where his injuries were disclosed. These include a double fracture of the skull, right arm and nose broken, breast bone fractured and two bad lacerations, besides numerous cuts and bruises. In spite of all this he has remained conscious and is expected to recover.

Mr. Hoyt is a young and active man, which are strong points in his favor.

**Grand Rapids  
Man Dives to  
His Death**

Adam Wicinski, 33, of 450 Grand-av., N. E., drowned in Slayton lake, seven miles east of Belding, Saturday night, after having dived from a raft.

Four companions of Wicinski told Deputies Ralph Bolt and John Matthews that Wicinski dived from the raft, returned to the surface so that one arm was out of the water, then disappeared. They did not realize at the time he was in distress. When he failed to appear again they attempted to reach him but were not successful. The body was recovered in about 15 feet of water after a search by Deputy Sheriffs Ralph Bolt and John Matthews.

Wicinski is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Wicinski, and two brothers and a sister.

Companions of Wicinski, according to Deputy Bolt, were Frank S. Miras, 832 Michigan-st., N. E., Tony Strokowski, 589 Eastern-av., N. E., Joe Gilski, 549 Emerald-av., N. E., and John Rusilowski, 925 Capen-ave., N. E. Funeral services were held at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning at St. Isidore's church. Burial in Polish Catholic cemetery—Grand Rapids Press.

**LOWELL COUPLE'S SON KILLED WHEN THROWN FROM HORSE**

A telegram received by Miss Florence King in Grand Rapids, stated that John, the twelve-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Fisher, of Chicago, had been thrown from a horse and instantly killed last Sunday. A host of Lowell friends will be grieved and extend sympathy to the bereaved parents so well known here. Mrs. Fisher was Miss Nina Wisner.

The following is taken from the Chicago Daily Tribune of July 30: John Fisher, 12 year old son of Charles G. Fisher, vice president of the Harris Trust and Savings bank, died Sunday night in a hospital in Sturgeon Bay, Wis., from injuries he received when thrown from a horse near Ephraim, Wis. The Fishers' Summer home is near Ephraim. They will return to Chicago today, when funeral arrangements will be made.—(Chicago Tribune.)

64 Years**

Nathan W. Blair, a well-known and respected farmer of Lowell township, died very suddenly at his home Monday at 12, midnight, aged 66 years. Although he had been in impaired health for several years, Nate, as he was familiarly known by his many friends, had continued moderately active up to the very night of his death.

On the evening of his passing he had done his chores as usual including the milking of several cows and after supper had driven to Lowell with his wife and daughter to see his doctor, who reported favorably on his condition. Returning home he retired as usual and slept, seemingly until 12 o'clock, when he passed quickly away, after a brief spell of restlessness.

Funeral services will be held at his late home at 2 p. m., this Thursday, Rev. A. B. Lenke, pastor of the Lowell Congregational church, officiating, clergyman; burial at Oakwood cemetery.

Nathan W. Blair, son of Nathan and Rebecca Blair, was born in Ada township May 7, 1863, and the family moved to the farm in Lowell township when Nathan W., was a child of two years, and it remained his home until his death sixty-four years later.

He was married May 9, 1891, to Laura McIntyre, who, with one daughter, Evelyn, survives him.

He also leaves to mourn his departure two sisters, Mrs. Eda Allen and Mrs. Sarah Jones, both of Lowell, other relatives, his Masonic brethren of Lowell Lodge No. 90, F & A. M., of which he was a member and a wide circle of friends.
