### Lowell Officers Get a Bunch of Negro Wearies

Saturday morning during the big storm at 3 o'clock, Deputy Sheriff Pat Boves and Leo Rowland, after a call by officers at Saginaw in search of a Negro wanted at Flint for criminal assault, rounded up six colored men who came in on the night Pere Marquette train from Saginaw, and broke up here into three pairs, captured them in three lots after a considerable driving which took in the elevated crossing on M 16 in Boston township. On arrival of detectives from Saginaw, all were discharged but one, who was held "on general suspicion, although not for the Flint crime. Deputy Boves was warmly commended by the Saginaw officers upon his prompt and efficient work, which had involved a sleepless night and much driving and bodily risk; for the small fee of about \$3.00, and the Lowell officers got soaked to the hide to boot.

### Four Children In Car Die at Rail Crossing

Lake Odessa, Aug. 6.—Four children, all members of one family, were killed instantly on the outskirts of Lake Odessa today, when the automobile in which they were riding rolled onto the Pere Marquette tracks in front of a fast passenger train, west-bound from Grand Rapids. The victims were the children of Mr. and Mrs. Royal Johnson. They were: Benjamin, 12 years old; Jerry, 8 years old; Royal Jr., 3 years old; Harriet, 1 year old.

Though Fred Bulling, the only witness of the crash, is not sure which of the children was at the wheel of the machine, it is assumed it was Benjamin. Bulling was working near the Lake Odessa Canning company crossing, where the tragedy occurred, and saw the machine stop for the railroad right-of-way.

Its occupants looked up and down the tracks, but apparently failed to see the approaching train. Just as the car started, Bulling heard the roar of the speeding train. His warning was drowned by the crash of the locomotive striking the automobile.

The demolished car and the bodies of its occupants were carried almost 1,000 feet through the village before the train could be brought to a halt. The body of Benjamin was found wedged in the brake rods beneath the engine.

The four bodies, those of the three older children in a single casket, were taken to the Worley undertaking rooms in Lake Odessa and Coroner B. J. Boynton impaneled a jury consisting of Floyd Gates, C. J. Yager, C. A. Hoffman, R. C. Smith, George Reiser and J. E. Peacock.

There are two other children in the family, Robert, 14 years old, and Betty, 6 years old. The father is a rural mail carrier, residing on a farm near Lake Odessa.—(Detroit Free Press.)

### Old Lowellite Dies in Crash Near Martin

Martin, Aug. 2.—H. A. Barrett, a produce buyer of Otsego, was injured fatally Thursday afternoon when he was pinned in his truck after it hit a tree three miles north of here, turned over and caught fire. He died in Kalamazoo Thursday evening from severe burns and arm and leg fractures.

Byron Carpenter, a farmer living near the scene of the accident freed Barrett from the blazing truck. The injured man was taken to Bronson hospital in Kalamazoo. The truck and its load of eggs were destroyed by the fire.

Mr. Barrett, widely known in the Otsego territory, is survived by the widow: a son in Rockford, Ill., a daughter, Mrs. Paul Scott, of Otsego, and a sister, Mrs. Adelia Deike, of Richland. He was a Mason and belonged to the Congregational church.—(Grand Rapids Press.)

Hiram A. Barrett, a former Lowell boy was born in Grattan Dec. 28, 1868. He attended Lowell High school and in 1892 was united in marriage to Charlotte Driscoll, later moving to Knoxville, Illinois. Three children were born, Ruth, James and Margaret. During the flu epidemic Mrs. Barrett and Ruth were taken. He later re-married and moved to Otsego in 1923. He is survived by his wife Mary and daughter, Mrs. Scott, of Otsego, Mich., a son, James Barrett, of Knoxville, Ill., a sister, Mrs. Adelle Deike, of Kalamazoo, a brother James, of California and other relatives and a host of friends. Burial at Otsego, Mich., Sunday August 4.

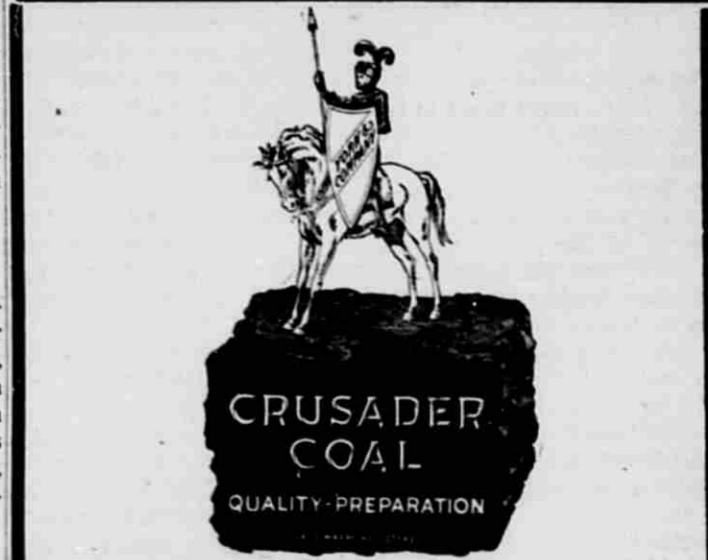

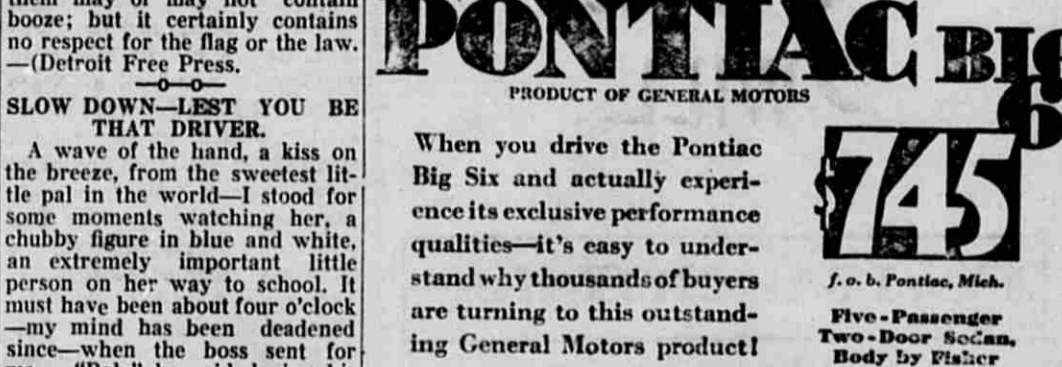

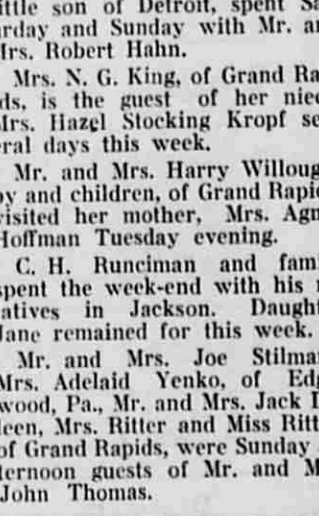
