Schools Expect Much Larger Attendance

ENROLLMENT TO BE LARGE.

Byrne Bests Jack Wisner in Mound Duel

Jerry Byrne, of Parnell, former M. S. C. pitching star and University of Michigan nemesis, pitched the Finest Oils of Lowell to a 3 to 1 victory over the Northeasterns, who offered Jack Wisner of major league fame on the firing line, Sunday afternoon at Ramona Athletic park in the second game of the Sunday double header. The Grand Rapids Window Cleaners, formerly the Northeastern Colts, defeated the Middleville Independents, 7 to 3, in an uphill fight.

Byrne was not only the pitching, but also the batting hero of the game. Hutchinson doubled with two out in the third and Byrne made one of the longest hits ever made on the grounds, a home run that passed within a few inches of the edge of the east end of the big score board and rolled behind it. Left Fielder Bills handled the ball so that Byrne did not attempt to pass third, but it was a home run under the rules through having passed out of sight behind the score board, Umpire Winslow so ruling.

The Finest Oils scored in the first inning on successive singles by Pulkiner, McCarthy and Hutchinson. Pulkiner went from first to third on a wild pitch and scored on McCarthy's hit. From the third inning to the ninth but two hits were made off Wisner's delivery, his support being of major league variety. Two scratch hits were made in the ninth, but did not turn into runs.

Nips Batema Off First.

Besides pitching splendidly and batting in the runs that were his team's margin at the finish, Byrne killed off what threatened to be a batting rally in the fourth by nipping Batema, a wide-awake base runner, off first base. Another time he foxily circled around the pitcher's box as though about ready to pitch while Second baseman Pulkiner of the Finest Oils pulled off the hidden ball on Wisner, much to Jack's great disgust and delight of the Lowell delegation in the grandstand.

The Northeasterns scored their lone run of the game on a double in the fourth inning by Weinmaster, a single by Batema and a sacrifice fly by Boggiano. Byrne did not issue a free transportation, twice winding up innings with two on with strikeouts and in every way demonstrated that Pres. Comiskey of the Chicago White Sox had the right dope when he sent for him to join his team at once.

Oilers Beat a Strong Team.

The Northeasterns presented the strongest lineup on paper form that has taken the field at Ramona for Sunday play at any time this season and it played good ball. Boggiano on second played a prenominal fielding game and Wisner fielded eight men out at first base. Inability to hit safely at times when his meant runs tells the tale of defeat in one of the prettiest games of the season at Ramona.

Splendid as it was Byrne's pitching was no better than his support. Ashley on third played a fielding game that would have been creditable to a major league star in that position. Olendorf fielded phenomenally in left field and Hapeman, whose costly errors last a game for the Finest Oils to the Ramonas two weeks before, redeemed himself by making some nice catches in right field. Both errors were made on hard chances. (Grand Rapids Herald).

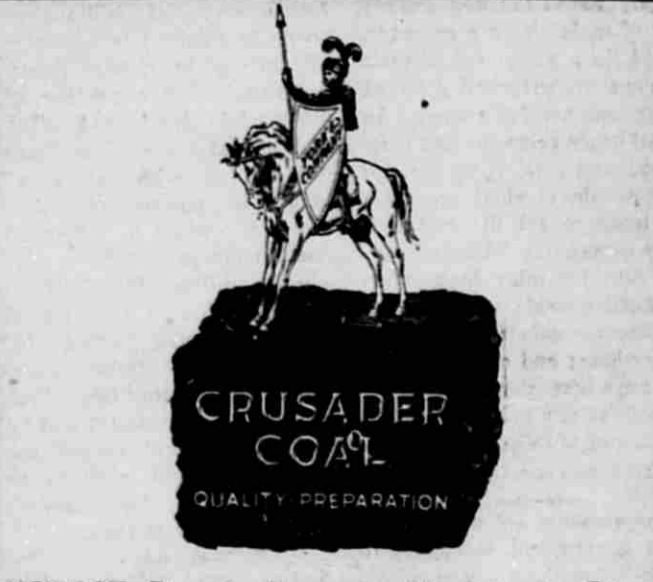

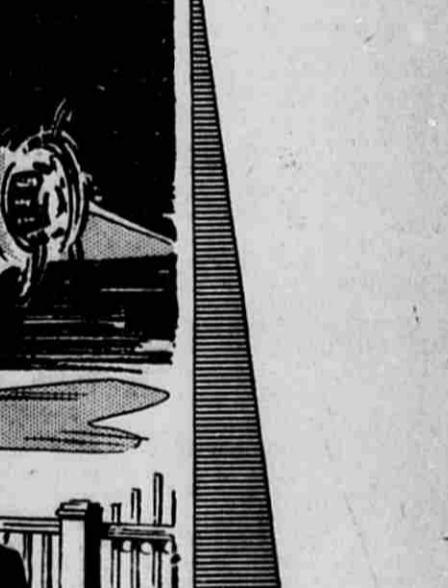

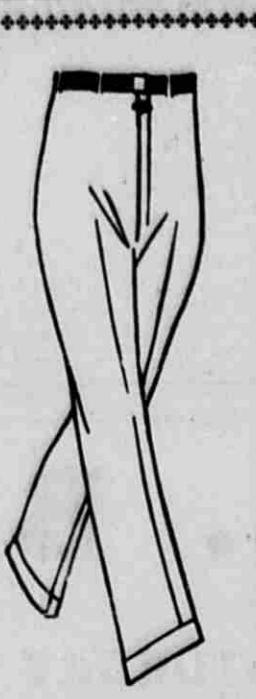
