## Lowell High Triumphs Over Ionians, 19-0

Playing before the largest crowd of the season Saturday, the Lowell High school football team clearly demonstrated its superiority over our Ionian rivals in every department of the game. After the first two minutes of play the ultimate result was never in doubt. Ionian received the ball and returned it to the 28 yard line. They failed to make the yards and kicked to Lowell's 40 yard line. On the first play Layer took the ball through the line and scampered 60 yards to what the fans thought was a touchdown. The officials, however, ruled that Elmer stepped outside on Ionian's 18 yard line and Lowell put the ball in play at this point. On four attempts Elmer carried the ball over the goal line. The attempt for the extra point failed. Again Ionian received and returned the ball to the 35 yard line. At this point Ionian was penalized 15 yards and they kicked to Lowell's 40 yard line. W. Wepman, Layer, Friesner, and Parsons took turns in carrying the ball and they did not stop until Genn carried it over for the second touchdown. The try for the extra point was successful. Again Layer kicked off to Ionian and they returned the ball to the 29 yard line. They were soon forced to punt and it was Lowell's ball on the 46 yard line as the quarter ended. Score Lowell-13, Ionian-0.

Lowell was forced to punt against the wind. It was Ionian's ball on her 30 yard line. Ionian punted with the wind to Lowell's 20 yard line. At this point Lowell again started to march down the field and finally lost the ball on a fumble on Ionian's 18 yard stripe. Again Ionian was forced to punt and Lowell returned it to our opponents 30 yard line. On another exchange of punts Ionian secured the advantage and Lowell was pushed back to mid field. The quarter ended just as Lowell suffered a 15 yard penalty for holding. Score Lowell-13, Ionian-0.

**Third Quarter**  
Ionian again received, but soon kicked to Lowell's 35 yard line. Wepman made several good games and it was Lowell's ball beyond mid-field. Friesner was forced to kick and he placed the ball outside on Ionian's 12 yard line. Ionian made two punts down, their first of the game on passes and end runs. Klahn broke through and recovered a fumble on the 40 yard line. Layer, who had returned to the game, made four first downs in a row and the third quarter ended with Lowell in possession of the ball on Ionian's 12 yard line. Score Lowell-13, Ionian-0.

**Fourth Quarter**  
After a 5-yard penalty for off-side Layer took the ball and on three plays crossed the goal line. The attempt for the extra point failed. Ionian again received the ball but punted to Lowell. Not being able to gain, Friesner kicked and the Ionian safety man made a beautiful return to their own 40 yard line. Ionian un-corked their best play of the game at this point, sending a man around end for 40 yards. The officials detected holding, however, and disallowed the full gain. The ball was put in play on Lowell's 35 yard line. Again Ionian made a first down and the visitors threatened to score for the first time. The locals braced however, and held for downs and Friesner punted out of danger. The game ended with the ball in Ionian's possession on Lowell's 40 yard line.

**Summary.**  
Too much credit can not be given to the Lowell line men who opened up big holes for the Lowell backs. Every line man including Baird, Houseman, Porritt, Johnson, Weaver, Klahn, and Gulembo are deserving of a great deal of commendation. These boys on offense took their opponents out of the play and made it possible for Layer, Friesner, Wepman, and Parsons to make their yards. We have never seen better line play than was exhibited in the game last Saturday. On defense the boys all knew just what to do and they held Ionian to five first downs while Lowell chalked up twenty. The Lowell back field is also deserving of much praise. Every one did just what they were supposed to do. Friesner handled the game in good shape. He did not find it necessary to resort to forward passes and his generalship throughout the game was excellent.

**Sparta Here Friday.**  
Sparta comes to Lowell Friday with the best team in its history. Their players are heavy and well trained. Coach Finch predicts a harder game Friday than the one was with Ionian last Saturday. This will be the second county game for Lowell.

## John Flogaus Old Resident Gone to Rest

John Flogaus, an old resident of Lowell, died at his home here Tuesday afternoon, after a year's illness of cancer, aged 70 years, 5 months, 5 days. He is survived by his wife and six children: Mrs. J. Helder of Chicago, Mrs. Ruth Herbig of Grand Rapids, Harry Flogaus of Albion, Carl Flogaus of Indianapolis, Grandal Flogaus of Kalamazoo and Miss Helen of Wamego, Kansas.

Funeral services will be conducted by Rev. J. Claus at the home Thursday at 3 o'clock, p. m., burial in Oakwood cemetery.

Mr. Flogaus was born in Germany May 11, 1859, and came to Grand Rapids at the age of 17, went from there to Ionian where he lived for a year or two and came to Lowell about 45 years ago and has lived here ever since. He was employed by the Lowell Cutter and Peckham Furniture companies for about twenty years and the last year of his working days was spent with the Superior Furniture company.

Mr. Flogaus suffered greatly in his long illness and death came to him as a blessed relief.

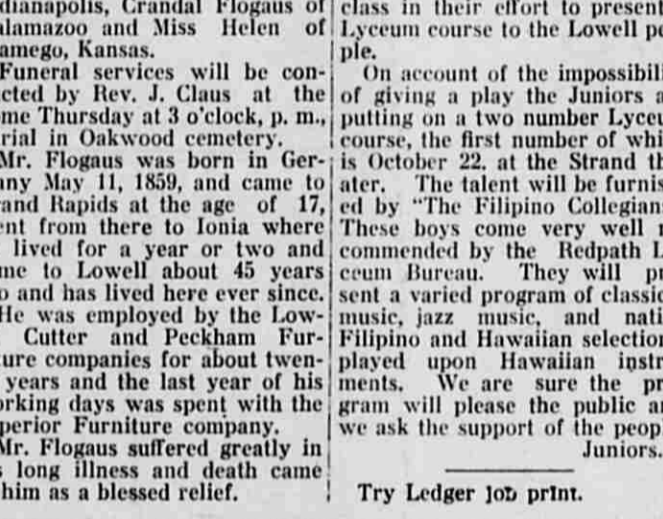
