1929 Ionia Free Fair Best Yet

Ionia, Dec. 9.—Disclosing a net profit of \$16,909.18, the 1929 free fair, held last August, will be recorded as the most successful since it was organized 15 years ago, according to Jesse H. Smith, treasurer, who submitted a report at the annual banquet of the Ionia Free Fair association held in Elks' temple tonight.

This year's profits exceeded by \$874.85 those of 1928, the best previous year, and brings the total net profit accruing from the fair during its 15 years' existence to \$100,098.49. Only once in that period has a deficit appeared. In 1917, the third year after its organization, the exposition went into the red for \$18.18, when expenditures of \$5,005.19 were met with an income of \$4,987.01.

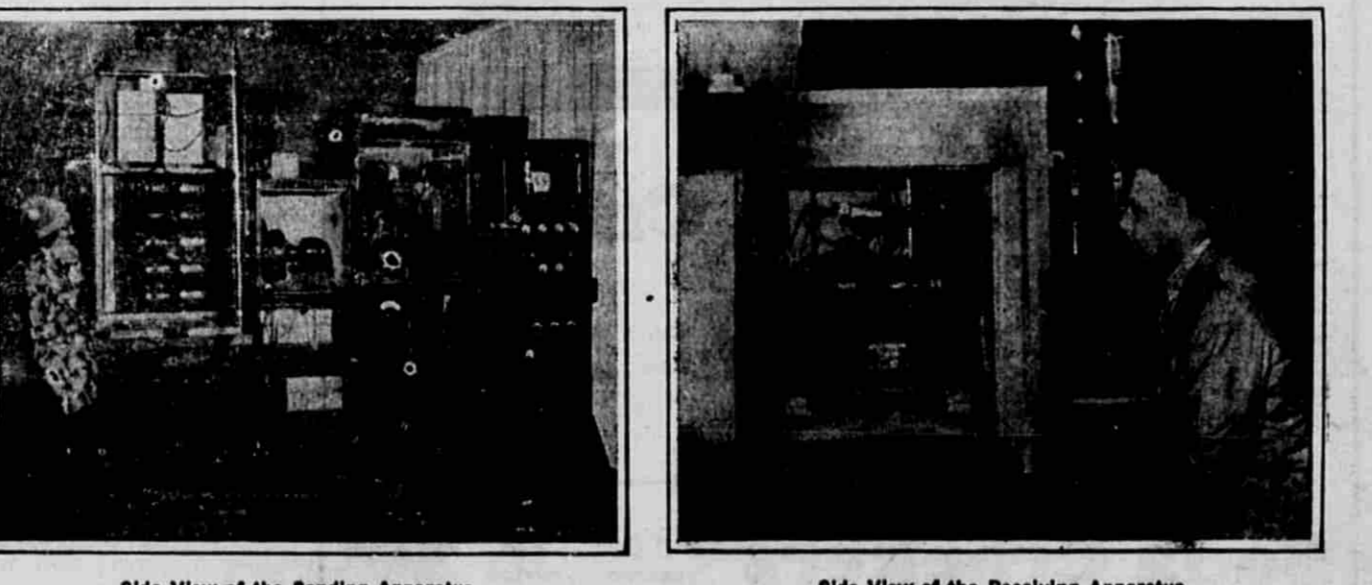


