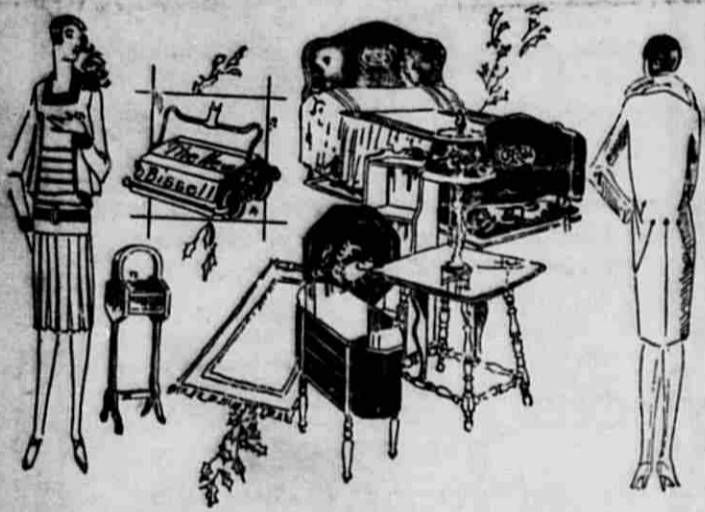

### It Snowed and Blowed and Piled Up

The worst snow storm and blizzard since that of January 1917 struck this vicinity last Wednesday afternoon and continued with high winds and drifting snow all Wednesday night and Thursday, resulting in a practical blockade of streets, highways and sidewalks. Few Lowell people attempted to shovel through their drifted porches and front walks until late Thursday and very few automobiles attempted to get anywhere in the village, though the milk men and meat and grocery men managed to break and wade through. The arrival of the snow plows on residence street was the signal for breaking out through several feet of drifted snow and Friday Lowell city officials put a gang of men, teams and shovels at work on Main street which was practically blocked, great drifts along the curbing preventing parking of cars and threatening to stop through traffic. By Saturday, Main street had been made passable and word came that by Governor Green's order every available man would be put to work to clear county and state highways and this resulted in week-end state-wide activities to clean these important avenues of trade and traffic. Following report of the storm through-out the state is taken from Monday's Grand Rapids Press:

#### SNOW AGAIN HITS LOWER MICHIGAN.

Detroit, Dec. 23.—The third snowstorm in a week struck southern Michigan at 4 o'clock Monday morning. Snow was still falling thickly in Detroit at 9 a. m., and thousands of workers were called out to help keep the city's streets clear. Another tieup of street car and motor traffic was feared. Jackson, Dec. 23.—Winter renewed its attack on Jackson and vicinity Sunday night and Monday morning by depositing a four-inch blanket of snow on top of the 14-inch surface as the result of last week's storm. Street traffic continued to be held up in the outlying sections, but in the business district conditions were improving. The board of public works has given word to scores of unemployed removing the snow in the past four days and expects to have all traffic lanes open within another 24 hours, provided no more snow falls. Ionia, Dec. 23.—The streets of Ionia, particularly in the business sections, were in fine shape Sunday as a result of the work of City Marshal John Speckin and his crews of shovelers. The north and south roads in the country were not so good, however, drifting badly under the cross-fire of a west wind, and the drifting snow not only filled in the cuts but packed more solidly than any drifts that had formed before. The main-traveled highways were all open Monday, however. Cadillac, Dec. 23.—All roads in this district were open Monday, according to Division Engineer Lew Burrigide of the state highway office. Grand Haven, Dec. 23.—The Grand Trunk carries again are running on schedule after being held in port because of the weather. The harbor is free of solid ice.

#### LOWELL INSTRUCTOR WILL DIRECT SCOUTS.

Lowell, Dec. 20.—The Boy Scout troop committee has decided to renew the scout charter for another year. Scoutmaster Milford Finch will return to school after the holidays, and A. F. Zwemer, science teacher in the High school, will take his place. William Van Vorst, who directed scout executives at Fremont five years, and L. R. Miller, history teacher, will be assistant scoutmasters. Superintendent W. W. Gumsir is chairman of the scout committee.—(Grand Rapids Press).

### Two Doctors Held in Death of G. R. Infant

Grand Rapids, Dec. 23.—Doctors Samuel B. Hirschberg and Seth Nibbelink, Grand Rapids physicians, were arrested today on manslaughter warrants issued by Prosecutor Bartel J. Jonkman, on information growing out of a baby's death. Arraigned in police court, they demanded an examining trial, which was set for January 3, and were released on bonds of \$10,000 each. The prosecutor's information is that Dr. Nibbelink attended the birth of a child on December 17, as assistant to Dr. Hirschberg, that the child, born early in the morning, was neglected until evening, when it died. A nurse employed by Dr. Hirschberg, according to the prosecutor's information, was told by the doctor she need not care for the baby, as it would die anyway. Dr. Harmon C. Wolfe, coroner, and the prosecutor, made several trips to the home, but have been unable to locate the mother, whose name was not revealed, although the husband is assisting the prosecutor in the case. The husband told the prosecutor that Hirschberg had come to his home Saturday before daylight and taking his wife to an attorney. He had not seen her since, the husband said. Prosecutor Jonkman served notice on Dr. Hirschberg that he would issue another warrant for withholding a witness if the woman was not produced in 24 hours.

#### KENT SCHOOL OBJECTORS LOSE ROUND IN COURT.

Grand Rapids, Dec. 23.—The Martin school district faction fighting the proposed expansion of the present school building and grounds on U. S.-16, lost the first round of the contest today when Circuit Judge William B. Brown dismissed the injunction restraining the board from continuing the work. The objectors base their claims upon the claim that a district school on a trunk line highway is a menace to pupils. A cemetery adjacent to the present property also is considered objectionable. They will continue their contest.

#### BID FOR WORDEN CO. IS HELD INADEQUATE.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Dec. 23.—Offer of the Toledo Realty company, sole bidder for the Worden Grocery company property, was held inadequate by Federal Judge Fred M. Raymond at the adjourned hearing today. The bid was \$400,000 plus an assumption of obligations amounting to \$101,000. The bidder was given an opportunity to boost its offer \$85,000 and a hearing for that purpose has been set for Thursday. Judge Raymond stated that if the bid were not so increased other bidders might be given another opportunity.—(Detroit Free Press).

#### OVERCOME BY FUMES, DESPONDENT MAN SAVED.

Grand Rapids, Dec. 23.—Physician labored several hours at Buttrick hospital to save the life of Martin Suttorp, 24 years old, who was rescued from the gas-filled kitchen of his home. Suttorp told police he has been unable to find employment for three months and that his family was without food or fuel. Hospital attendants said he probably would live.—(Detroit Free Press).

### County Cleans Twenty Miles Road in City

County road officials will assume charge of clearing 20 miles of streets within the limits of Grand Rapids, allowing the city's equipment, now heavily overburdened, to go to work on districts never given snow removal service. Asst. City Manager Waring has announced. As the county's equipment has to leave the Front ave. garage and travel to the county roads over city roads it has been agreed that the county's machines, while going to their work outside the city, shall clean the streets over which they travel. Mr. Waring said this could be done at very little cost to the county and with a great saving to the city. The city yesterday disposed of great heaps of snow, trucked from the streets by taking a section from the rail on the Pearl st. bridge, making it possible for two or three trucks to back up and dump their loads at the same time. Trap doors in Fulton street and Bridge street bridges, through which snow is usually dumped, were choked with ice and snow. Blasting to break the ice and allow the current to have the man-made ice hills was futile and so was the attempt to have the great piles washed away by fire hoses. Running water at the Pearl st. bridge lead to operations there. City Mgr. Welsh has announced that he will ask the commission to consider the feasibility of a removal-by-steam plan offered by M. D. Baldwin, an engineer. The plan would call for running hot pipes under grated gutters so that when the snow was scraped and piled near the curbs, it could thus be melted.—(Grand Rapids Herald).

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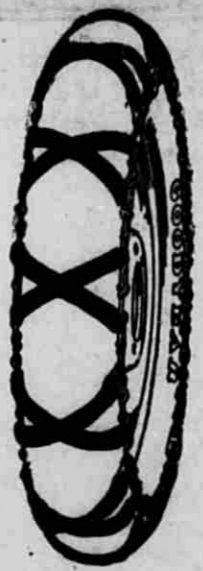
