> ADVISES THAT OLD WHEAT BE SOLD NOW.

Robert Palmer, local elevator man and farmer, is advising all farmers who are holding wheat which is one year old or older, to market it at once while it is still marketable and thereby save the grain or the money which it re-Mr. Palmer says that a lot o

wheat which is being held and which is of the 1928 or earlier harvests, and which is occasional-ly being brought to the mills or markets, is found to be infested with a small weevil which works through the grain and ruins it for other than possible feed value. The weevil is a small bug which enters one side of the wheat kernel and eats his way through to the other side and then starts in on another kernel. A lot of these weevils, working aven aight hours a day will de even eight hours a day will de-stroy a lot of wheat within a short time if it is not moved and put on the market and through the mills before it falls in the path of the pests. The work of the weevil, says Mr. Palmer, is confined to wheat Mr. Palmer, is confined to wheat which is one year or more old and a lot of the grain-which was offered for sale at mills in this section of the state, on being found to be infested with the in-sects, has been refused by the buyers. Mr. Palmer feels that farmers who have old wheat on hand should look after it and market it while it is still market-able.—(Belding Banner News.




