The reader may ask what is so new and dangerous about this law. In brief, the offending section provides that any person engaged in any way in the "regular or customary" production of "a malicious, scandalous and defamatory newspaper, magazine or other periodical, is guilty of a nuisance and all persons guilty of anisance and all persons guilty of anisance and all persons guilty of such nuisance may be enjoined."

The injunction takes the form of actually stopping publication. A judge elected politically and inflamed by a partisan or independent newspaper's attack upon himself, his party or his friends, whether the criticisms are just or unjust, is given the power to decide for himself whether such a newspaper is "regularly defamatory," and whether it shall be permitted to continue in business, Without trial he can issue at temporary injunction and close it up. DESTROYING FREEDOM OF THE PRESS.

Two years ago a small Minneapolis "scandal sheet" declared that cartain efficiency of the transport of the t

apolis "scandal sheet" declared that certain officials of the city government were conversant with grafting activities. The laws of libel permitted those officials to sue and force establishment either of the truth or falsity of this statement, and collect damages. But they did not sue for libel. They invoked a 1925 Minnesota gag law permitting the suppression of newspapers by injunction. Last week the Minnesota supreme court for the second time upheld the constitutionality of this law and the suppression of the paper.

As a result virtually every editor in America—most of whom would ordinarily be ranged against such a sheet as is involved in the Minneapolis case—is obliged to take up the support of that paper's cause as a matter of that paper's cause as a matter of the city plications to so connect him are instances of cheap and odious politics, insulting to the public's sense of honor and decency more than to the personal sensibilities of the President.


