Ada Family in Death Crash at McCords

Three persons were killed and 16 injured, four seriously, in auto accidents in Kent and Ottawa counties last night and yesterday. The dead and two of the injured composed the John Baker family in Ada, partially wiped out when their auto collided with a train near McCords.

A Grand Haven school teacher and two others were injured, the former dangerously, when their car struck a telephone pole near Holland. Ten persons were injured in two smashups just outside of Grand Rapids on West Bridge and Leonard rds. Four are from Muskegon, two from Marne and the other four from Grand Rapids.

The Train-Auto Crash. Death, riding the pilot of a speeding Pere Marquette passenger train, reached out through a shilling shroud of show shortly after sunset yesterday when it snatched the lives of John Baker, 39, Ada laborer, his daughter, Johanna, 18, and a son, Martin, 6. The lives of Mrs. Baker, 36, and another son, John, Jr., 12, were spared. Mrs. Baker, however, is in a serious condition with internal bruises, fractures and a possible fractured skull. John, Jr., sustained only a broken leg. Both are in Butterworth hospital.

The accident occurred at the Whitneyville crossing of the railroad and no witnesses other than the train crew could be found. According to John, Jr., the only person able to give an account of the accident, Johanna, who was driving, apparently did not observe the signal which was flashing and did not hear the train. The automobile was enclosed and snow, driven by wind, obscured the vision. The dead and injured were put on the train and taken to McCords, where the D. G. Lyzen ambulance was summoned from Grand Rapids. The ambulance rushed the mother and son to Butterworth hospital and then returned for the bodies of the others. The bodies will be held at Lyzen's until Mrs. Baker's exact condition is determined.

AGAIN ASKS COMMITMENT OF MRS. ETTA L. BURGESS. Kalamazoo, Feb. 18.—Stating that a recent examination of Mrs. Pearl Burgess, who at her trial last fall claimed insanity as a defense against a charge of the murder of Mrs. Etta L. Fairchild, indicates she still is insane, Prosecutor Paul M. Tedrow Monday filed a petition asking her commitment to Ionia state hospital.

The examination, he declares, was made Feb. 6, by psychiatrists from Kalamazoo State hospital. Mrs. Burgess was found guilty of Mrs. Fairchild's murder, but was granted a new trial by Judge George V. Weimer. Following that Prosecutor Tedrow filed a petition asking her commitment to the Ionia institution, but no hearing ever was held on that petition, so he has filed a new one.

Judge Ferguson Tells of the Allen Inn Party

"In an attempt to discredit Governor Fred W. Green before a Congressional Committee in Washington, a professional politician has made statements regarding a dinner given in honor of four newly appointed Wayne Circuit Judges, of which I have the honor to be one."

"The four guests of honor were speakers and the Governor closed the program with a brief address."

"Music was furnished by the Catholic Boys' Band, made up of forty boys ranging between the ages of seven and seventeen years."

In addition to this a short program of songs and dancing was given by professional performers who have appeared before audiences made up of some of the best men and women in Detroit. At the conclusion of the Governor's address, at 11:10 p. m. he provided the boys of the band with ice cream and then left immediately for Lansing in his automobile.

"No liquor was served at this party to anyone. No disorder occurred."

"This dinner was an appreciated compliment to these four newly appointed judges and was attended by more than two hundred citizens prominent in the social, business and industrial life of the city."

"These are the facts behind a cowardly political attack on Governor Green and I would welcome an opportunity to so testify before the Congressional Committee or any one else."

This statement was made by Judge Homer Ferguson of the Wayne circuit court, himself a personal dry advocate.

Lowell Barber Takes Own Life at 39

Shirley Weaver, 39 years old, a Lowell barber for several years, with shop in the Pullen block, shot himself to death at his home in this village Saturday at about 11:30 a. m.

He had worked all the morning at the shop, recently sold to James Fahni, and returned to his home for dinner.

While Mrs. Weaver was after a pail of water from the well just outside the house, the fatal shot was fired.

Justice Springate was summoned, and after investigation reported the matter to the County Coroner, who decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

His health was given as the cause for his rash act.

Mr. Weaver leaves his wife and a son, living here, his father and mother, who live at Hastings, and other relatives and many friends.

Funeral services were held Monday with burial at Hastings. Rev. A. Lemke, officiating clergyman.
