Three persons were killed and 16 injured, four seriously, in auto accidents in Kent and Ottawa counties last night and yesterday. The dead and two of the injured composed the John Baker family in Ada, partially wiped out when their auto collided with a train near McCords.

A Grand Haven school teacher A Grand Haven school teacher and two others were injured, the former dangerously, when their car struck a telephone pole near Holland. Ten persons were injured in two smashups just outside of Grand Rapids on West Bridge and Leonard rds. Four are from Muskegon, two from Marne and the other four from Grand Rapids. One of the men from Marne and a Grand Rapids woman are in a serious condition.





Speeding Up Your Turnover

WHEN your merchandise turnover is sluggish and your revenue falls off it's time to look your business squarely in the eye.

Looking, you're likely to find two particularly disturbing factors. One is that some of your customers are shopping outside of Lowell. The other is that these same customers, and some others also, are buying from mail order houses.




