Last Roll Call for Old Civil War Veteran

Samuel Stark Hudson, oldest son of Alexander N., and Lydia Hudson, was born March 4, 1843, in Farmington township, Ontario county, New York, and died at Lowell, Mich., Friday morning, Feb. 28, 1930 in his 87th year.
In 1861, at the age of 18, he responded to the first call of President Lincoln for volunteers, and served throughout the Civil war, fighting in the first Battle of Bull Run, and being present in the Grand Review in Washington at the end of the war. His entire military service was in the Eastern army, serving first under General Meade at Gettysburg and with Grant in the closing campaign in Virginia. He was twice captive by Confederate soldiers, and suffered imprisonment in Libby prison for a time until exchanged.
After the war was over he moved with his father's family to Michigan, and soon after settled in Lowell where most of his life since has been spent. Jan. 5, 1868 he was united in marriage with Josephine Allen with whom he lived until her death about 23 years ago, May 31, 1906.
His work for many years was farming, but a considerable portion of his life he was engaged in mill work and as a carpenter.
He is survived by one son, Sherril A. Hudson, of Lowell, a daughter, Mrs. Lewis Striggow; two grandchildren, a brother, Elsworth Hudson, of Bostwick Lake, three sisters, Mrs. Emaline Dennis, of Kent City, and Mrs. Lucretia Steele, of Milford, Mich. and Mrs. Gertrude Hawk, of Lowell.
The funeral service was held at the Yeiter chapel Sunday afternoon, Rev. A. T. Cartland, officiating. He was buried in Oakwood cemetery with military honors under the auspices of the local American Legion Post.
