## City-County Supervisors Seek Control

Scoring an overwhelming victory with the aid of votes cast by two retiring Grand Rapids supervisors and Supervisor Walter H. Brooks, of East Grand Rapids, rural members of the Kent county board of supervisors yesterday named Maurice Post of Algoma township permanent chairman. It was the closing act of a two-and-one-half-hour battle in which city forces lost practically every round. The ballot on Mr. Post's election was 28 votes to 23 for Chas. P. Kelm, of East Grand Rapids, city compromise candidate. Mr. Post accepted the chair, saying: "I will try to be fair to both sides."

Desertion of Edward Tolsona, of the first ward and Fred W. Fuller, of the second ward, "lame duck" supervisors, who were defeated at the recent elections, at the critical moment when Sup. Nicholas Kik called for a ballot on an adjournment motion that would have given the city the upper hand, sounded the downfall of the city's ambitious attempt to pick the chairman for the second year in succession.

**Gets Upper Hand.**  
Mr. Tolsona and Mr. Fuller, as well as Mr. Brooks, who is facing possible recall in his home ward because of his stand with the rural interests, voted against adjournment, giving the rural side, which wished to proceed with naming a chairman, the advantage. The vote on this issue was 24 to 27. On the next motion, that of proceeding with election of a permanent chairman, the vote was 28 to 23 in favor, with C. Evan Johnson, retiring city chairman, casting his ballot in favor of the rural side.

The final vote was by written ballot and aside from the fact that the three supervisors mentioned in the first paragraph did not hand in slips of pink color bearing the typewritten name of Mr. Kelm, there was no means of showing how they balloted on this issue. The result, however, was the same as on the vote to proceed with the election. Both Mr. Fuller and Mr. Brooks objected strenuously to balloting openly on the chairman. **New Members Not Seated.** The city failed in its attempt to seat its three newly elected supervisors and unseat Mr. Tolsona and Mr. Fuller, whose places and votes the new members, favorable to the city, would have taken. The lengthy and wordy discussion resulted in Pros. Attkinman being called in repeatedly to rule on matters of procedure and plainly brought out the antagonism between the country and city forces which has grown rather than diminished since last October. Following the election, the board authorized sending Probate Judge Clark E. Higbee as a delegate to the international mental hygiene convention to be held at Washington and adjourned until 9:30 o'clock this morning. (Continued on Page 4)
