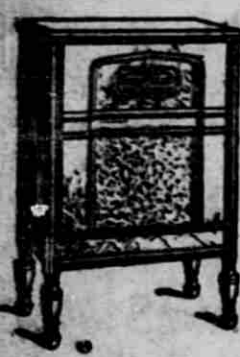

The body of Mrs. Mary Althen, widow of Charles Althen, an old-time Lowell merchant, was laid to rest at Oakwood cemetery Monday afternoon, after funeral service at Yeiter's chapel, with Rev. A. B. Lemke, officiating clergyman, attended by many old friends.

Mrs. Althen passed away April 15th at her home in Wilmington, Calif., where she had resided for the last five years and had endeared herself to many.

—ATTENTION!— SOLDIERS AND SAILORS TAX EXEMPTION.

Any soldier or sailor who served three months or more in the Spanish, Civil or Mexican war is entitled to \$1,000.00 exemption on their real estate, if they file with the Supervisor an affidavit in accordance with act 331 Public Acts 1919. This law requires these affidavits to be filed annually, and if you do not file the affidavit you will not be entitled to any exemption. Widows of such soldiers are also entitled to this exemption if they file the affidavit. Supervisor Lewis M. City-County Supervisors Seek Control

(Continued from last week)

A motion to adjourn until May 5 was shelved in an argument by Mr. Steinmann at this time, but declared out of order as the board was not yet in session, and a few minutes later Mr. Jonkman brought in his written opinion setting aside contentions of the city that the new supervisors must take office at once.

The opinion, in essence, was to the effect that when Grand Rapids went under his own charter in 1916 it was specifically stated that newly elected supervisors are to take office on May 1 of that year and hold office for one full year or more. It followed, the opinion held, that every succeeding supervisor should serve beginning on May 1; otherwise, if the new supervisors took office at once, those in office would not fulfill their election for a full year.

The ruling against the city's contention was based on the fact that the city charter and the state law, which governs elections of township supervisors, are at odds and the only remedy is a change in the city charter. Considerable argument arose over the attorney's ruling, although it finally was admitted by the city. This automatically eliminated the city's hopes for a decisive majority prediction that Mr. Fuller and Mr. Tolman casting their final ballots, would go against their former allies, were fulfilled.

Mrs. McPherson Declines. The country forces immediately began their drive to elect a chairman with Glenn Hunsberger leading the attack. He placed the name of Thomas J. Walsh, as temporary chairman before the board and Mr. Kik countered by proposing the name of Mrs. McPherson, who promptly declined the honor. The only motions suddenly filled the air, cluttering up the notes of Mr. Neumann so that he had to resort to the prosecutor to get straightened out.

Mr. Kik made a substitute motion that Mr. Walsh be named temporary chairman until the May meeting, but this was declared out of order on the grounds that there is no May meeting unless specially called by the board. Mr. Kik altered his substitute motion to name Mr. Walsh chairman "until the next meeting." Mr. Walsh squelched this by pointing out that rules of the board stated a permanent chairman must be named at the April meeting and that only custom had made it possible to postpone election of a permanent chairman by adjourning until May.

This immediately precipitated an argument as to whether the board had any rules at all, inasmuch as it had not approved any at the session, or whether the old rules held. (Continued on Page 7)
