**TRUE TALES OF THE TELEPHONE**

The small boy shouting at a cliff and hearing his voice carried back to him, an echo is merely an amusing plaything. To the telephone transmission engineer, it is often a most perplexing problem. Whenever a telephone current meets any sudden change in circuit conditions, a part of it may be reflected back to its source, where it echoes the sound carried by the original current.

On short lines, just as in small rooms, echoes are not perceptible. On long loaded cables, however, the interval between original sound and echo may be so long as to cause serious complications. Unless measures were taken to guard against them, echoes might travel back and forth indefinitely, making conversation difficult.

Telephone engineers get rid of these troublesome intruders by installing special devices or switches so sensitive that they are operated by the voice itself. These devices or switches permit a voice current to pass in the desired direction but form a barrier against any reflected portion which would otherwise interfere with conversation. They are, in effect, automatic traps set by the voice to capture its own echo.
