One Auto In U. S. For Every 4.5 Persons Motor vehicles of all types registered throughout the world on January 1, of this year, totaled 35,127,398, an increase of 3,092,626 vehicles, or nine per cent over the total of 1929, according to Charles F. Baldwin, assistant chief, automobile division, department of commerce. Of this total 26,653,450 are credited to the United States; more than three times the number of motor vehicles registered in all foreign and non-contiguous countries. Ownership of motor cars in the United States is far in advance of any other country with one automobile to every 4.5 persons, comparing with one for every 216 persons outside of the United States. "This explains," says the Accident Statistics bureau of New York, "why the United States has an accident death rate of 79.2 per 100,000, more than twice as high as Germany, France, Italy and Holland.
