Ail mail was delivered, school children and farmers co-operating with the mail men. The car belonging to Carrier Newton Coons broke down bucking the drifts. The moleboard plows were used by the county road commission where possible and trucks bucked the drifts repeatedly until the plows became stranded and had to be pulled out. All of the 700 miles of state and county trunklines were open to traffic many times during the storm, but as long as the wind was whipping the snow back into the roads the job was never done.

The most effective means of combatting this snow were the huge V-plows which were capable of pushing aside the heavily packed drifts.

Warren R. Townsend, chairman of the road commission, counseled the general public not to attempt to travel except on business over the trunklines until this storm was over. Travel can now be undertaken safely.

Detroit is given considerable of the extra representation, while the sparsely settled counties of northern Michigan must be rearranged into districts with wider areas.

Rep. Darin, of River Rouge, has introduced one bill which provides for the additional representation, giving Wayne county five congressmen and part of the sixth. The bill attempts to make as little change as possible insofar as it affects the present congressmen, but the changes are radical enough to justify the expectation that there will be plening of change made before the measure is finally enacted into law.
