—Insects which have been living on the fat of the land in home gardens while avoiding the wholesale poison campaigns used by commercial truck growers are going to find Michigan an inhospitable state this year as Michigan State College has recently published a bulletin which tells how to kill insects in retail lots.

Formulae for preparing poison Formulae for preparing poison mixtures advocated in this publication are reduced to quantities which can be used advantageously on small gardens, and, in some cases, poisons or other methods of control which are not commercially practical are recommended for the amateur gardener.

Ornamental Bridges

Built at Lower cost

A new type of bridge construction now in use in Kent county permits a marked saving, it was reported this week by Otto S. Hess, county engineer, as the first of the two new structures on REFRIGERATOR

commercially practical are recommended for the amateur gardener.

Remedial measures recommended range from kerosene baths applied to the insects to paper collars applied to the plants. Either method is claimed to be effective in controlling the particular insect's appetite for which the control is recommended. Those who eat spinach will find consolation in this bulletin as no insects are listed which make a specialty of feeding on this plant. Apparently, all the rest of the favorites of the salad makers have qualities that also endear them to some variety of bug, and the gardener must combat these insects before he can appease his own hunger.
