

WEATHER TERMS

WEATHER TERMS

Almost every American is interested in the weather predictions, yet many of them do not exactly understand the terms used by the Weather Bureau. To enable the public to understand better E. B. Calvert of the Weather Bureau explains the exact meaning of various terms used by the forecaster, as follows:

"Clear," Mr. Calvert points out, signifies not only no rain, snow, or sleet ahead, but a sky practically free from clouds, while "fair," also promising no precipitation, does not exclude some clouds from the sky. The terms "generally fair" weather, he says is employed in connection with forecasts for relatively large areas, and while there may be some cloudiness and possibility light precipitation in scattered places, clear to partly cloudy skies will prevail over most of the area.




