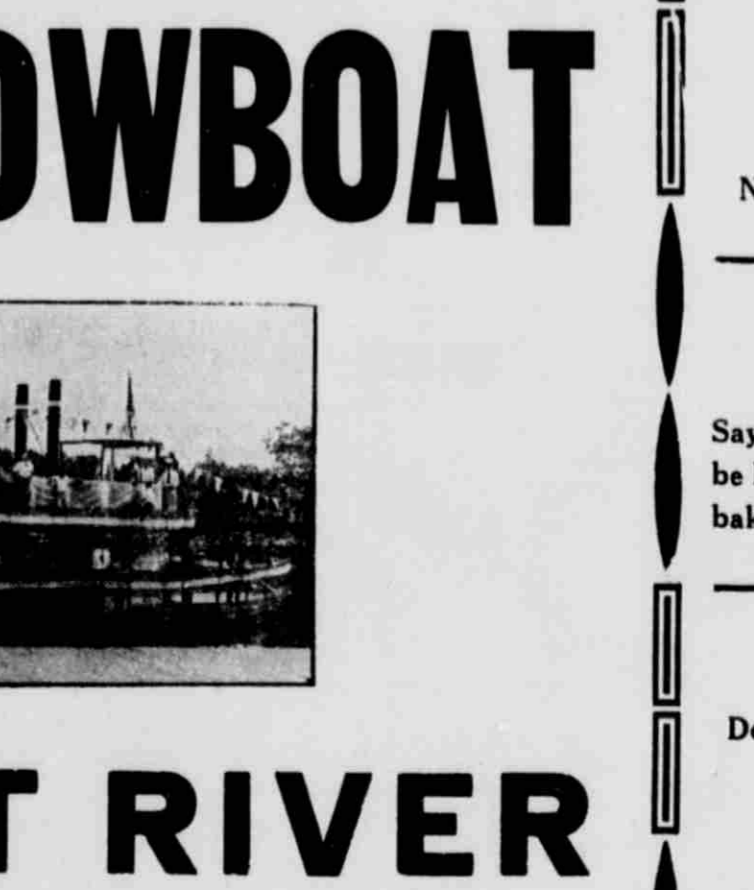

all a job to enable the working man to provide for himself and family bread and butter and a comfortable place in which to live and to help maintain a stable government is much more important than the matter to which some are devoting their entire time and attention.

The platform of the Democratic party favors the repeal of the eighteenth amendment. The platform of the Republican party does not favor "a submission," to use the language of the platform, "limited to the issue of retention or repeal," but it says that the "people should have an opportunity to pass upon a proposed amendment the provision of which, while retaining in the federal government power to preserve the gains already made in dealing with the evils inherent in the liquor traffic, shall allow states to deal with the problem as their citizens may determine, but subject always to the power of the federal government to protect those states where prohibition may exist and safeguard our citizens everywhere from the return of the saloon and attendant abuses."

Contrasts Party Planks
As between the Democratic and the Republican planks on this question as a Republican I choose the Republican plank and will vote to submit an amendment in accordance therewith.

There were two major organized drives made upon congress during the last session both of them lead by zealots in their cause, both of them threatening the political life of every member of congress who failed to vote for the legislation they demanded should be passed. But here the likeness ceases. One was composed of hungry, poorly clad, many of them homeless, veterans of the World war. The other was composed of well fed, elegantly dressed, well groomed, attractive women, some of them dwellers in mansions—members of the Women's Organization for National Prohibition Reform so-called.

How well do I remember the call on me at my office in Washington of 25 or more such women from Michigan led by Mrs. Alger of Detroit and Mrs. McAllister of Grand Rapids.

The bonus marchers openly declared that if congress failed to pass the bonus they were going home into the districts of every member of congress who voted against it and defeat him for reelection.

The women quite as openly told how large the membership of their organization was and how they intended to organize and put workers into every voting precinct in this congressional district to defeat me unless I favored repeal of the eighteenth amendment. I resisted both these drives because I felt that the causes which they advocated were against the best interest of the country and now I must leave it to the disinterested and patriotic citizens of the district to see to it that they do not succeed in their efforts.

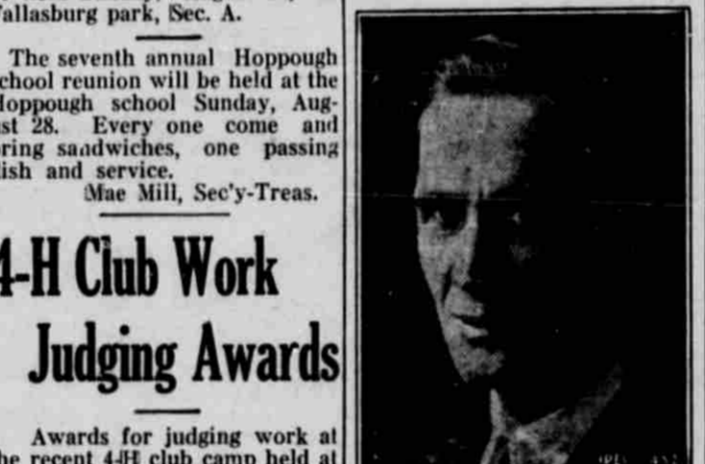
The second annual Kent County 4-H club fair will be held at the West Michigan Fair grounds, Wednesday, August 31st. Work from both winter and summer projects will be on display.
