Freight rate reductions of 8 to 12 per cent on interstate shipments of Michigan potatoes to leading markets in Ohio, Indiana and northern Kentucky, were announced Saturday. The new rates will encourage shippers to use railroads.

According to census bureau reports Grand Rapids was lowest among 86 cities in fatal automobile accidents during the year which ended Aug. 6. Grand Rapids had 4.6 fatal accidents for each 100,000 population. A year ago the city had 9.3.
