ROOPER RADIO SYSTEM LINKS LAW-ENFORCEMENT GROUPS EFFECTIVELY

Neighbor States Average 41 Holdups in Banks Annually; Michigan, 13

Despite an apparent increase in

state-owned police radio system, their own posts, radio-equipped cruisers, and scout cars and the co-operation of sheriffs and city police departments can set up a blockade that is virtually im-

penetrable. The success of this quick fusion emergency is being reflected in records of bank robberies of Michigan and surrounding states. Four Illinois, Indiana, and Minnesotashowed an average of 41 bank robberies each last year, Michigan had 13.

Twenty-nine men participated in these 13 Michigan "jobs." Twentyone of them have been arrested and convicted.

Total loot in the Michigan robberies amounted to \$44,961, of which \$24,779.50 was recovered. The loot in Illinois, by way of comparison, was \$250,000 in its 71

bank robberies during the year. None of the states reported above has a state police organization similar to that in Michigan nor boasts of a state-owned police radio which links all law-enforce-

The effectiveness of Michigan's defense against bank hold-ups was manifest about a year ago when hold-up insurance rates to the banks of ten states were doubled while the Michigan rate was left unchanged. The ten states were Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois, Nebraska, Indiana, Ohio, Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma.

this advantage in price? Without the Americar tariff on wheat, Canadian wheat would have poured across the border, breaking our price to a level with theirs. While the American farmer did not realize the full amount of the tariff, as he would if his production were limited to the domestic demand, he did get, on the basis of this comparison, an average benefit of 18 cents a tushel. A further index of the protection

actually enjoyed by the American farmer through the tariff on wheat is the fact that while the week before the tariff became effective foreign grown wheat to the amount of 2,260,006 bushels was sold in this country, the week after the tariff bill became law these sales dropped to 37,000 bushels.

Even more striking is the comparison of prices in American and foreign grain centers. Figures gathered by the Bureau of Agricultural mics in February, 1931, covering May futures on wheat, showed prices as follows:

Chicago, 83% cents a bushel; Winnipeg, 60 cents; Liverpool, 65 cents; Buenos Afres, 49% cents. Without tariff protection, this situation ordinarily is reversed, the Liverpool price being approximately 15 to 18 cents above the Chicago market, that representing approximately the cost of transporting wheat from Chicago to Liverpool. The differential in this case repre sents nearly the entire 42 cents protection provided for by the tar
