

PLACE INSIDE LIMITS OF ADJACENT CITY

Article III—Section 1. In all elections every inhabitant of this state being a citizen of the United States; " And PROVIDED FURTHER, that the legislature may provide by law that the electors of a township may cast their ballots at a township paleolocated within the limits of a city which has been incorporated from territory formerly a part of the township.

The above amendment is of little or no interest to rural sections. It provides certain changes regarding the voting precincts in townships which have become a part of a city. It applies particularly to that territory adjoining Detroit, and other fast growling cities.
