### Editorial Comment

TEMPERANCE WILL WIN  
In the midst of the welter of discussion which now agitates the public mind on the subject of prohibition, let us not lose sight of the ultimate goal which is in the heart of every right-thinking man and woman in this country. While the Ledger is not now expressing any opinion on the subject of prohibition, it is well for all to recognize that neither the Eighteenth amendment nor the Volstead Law is an end in itself but that they were adopted as a means to promote temperance and secure sobriety for the part of our people. Regardless of the disputes which rage concerning the effectiveness of the salient prohibition, the temperance movement throughout the United States should be able to get together and make effective the fight on such beverages.

No one who has come into contact with a family which has been cured by the effects of strong drink can resist the temptation of the subject of temperance. Examples are many but none more powerful than the spectacle of two Chicago boys who spent Christmas day in jail because of family quarrels in which each had been forced to kill one of their own family group.

On the other hand, New York State and New York City, as well as the entire nation are facing the most serious problem of their existence in the present depression, witnesses testified at the Senate Manufacturers Committee's hearing on the Coughlin-Lafollette \$500,000 unemployment relief bill. Representatives of New York relief agencies reported a constant increase in unemployed and that the problem would soon demand the financial intervention of the Federal government if a situation of the utmost gravity is not to get out of control.

However, despite the general slump, American foreign trade is still greater than that of any other country, according to figures by the United States Chamber of Commerce. A review of the first nine months of 1932 made by the chamber indicates that United States exports for that period amounted to \$1,828,000,000, which was seventeen per cent greater than the value of exports of Germany, twenty-three per cent greater than that of Great Britain and more than double that of France.

President Hoover foresees as little serious as any Government reorganization plan that may be formulated by the President-elect Hoover. A review of the first nine months of 1932 indicates that it does not need prophesying that the time will come when the people of this country will unite against liquor and other salient actual temperance. Those who now seek repeal will have a heavy responsibility upon them if they succeed because the only justifiable cause of such a procedure would be the improvement of conditions and the lessening of drinking and debauchery.

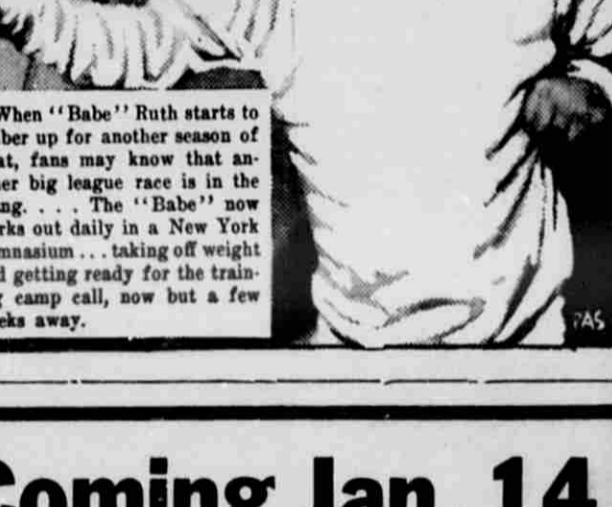

#### Kent Highway Taxes Reduced 60 Per Ct.

Taxes for highway purposes in Kent County have been reduced 60.35 per cent in the past year, according to statistics compiled by the State Highway Department.

Economics instituted by the county and township officials and laws adopted by the legislature, made the reduction possible.

In 1931 the County tax was \$290,416.09 but this was reduced to \$78,264.05 in the last year. This includes reductions in county, township and Coverd Road levies.

The total reduction of local highway taxes in the State amounted to 68.5 per cent.

#### Small Profits Make Farmers Study More

##### Increased Enrollment at Michigan State College Said to be Due to Need for Careful Training

Decreased prices for farm products have apparently convinced many Michigan young men that thorough training in general and special farm industries is needed to offset the narrow margins of profit, according to the director of short courses at Michigan State College who points to the largest enrollment in short courses since 1922.

Those already enrolled have entered the 16 weeks course in general agriculture in which the students are given training in the production of field crops, dairy products, fruit, and other lines of farm work. The College also has many courses which run for a day or a week, when training in only one subject is given.

Five of these special courses began January 3. Dairy production, dairy manufacture, agricultural engineering, poultry, and fruit production are the subjects. Other courses are given later in the year.
