Early Checks Show That Total Will Be Greatest In State's History

Lansing, Mich.—Michigan farmers, home owners, industrialists and merchants, unable longer to bear the tremendous tax burden heaped upon their shoulders by tax spending governmental units...

There is talk of new forms of taxation, but members of the legislature are wondering who will be able to pay any new taxes.

The total state delinquent tax for 1932 as reported on March 1, 1932 amounted to only \$1,796,816.34. Much of this was later paid.

In 1929 the amount was \$5,015,361.17. For 1930, the amount jumped to \$6,945,937.47 and in 1931 it reached the staggering total of \$9,192,092.62...

There is no way of estimating just what it will be for 1932, but early reports from county treasurers indicate a most distressing condition among the taxpayers of Michigan.

1933 AUTO TAG TIME EXTENDED BY FITZGERALD

EVENTUAL SLASH IN FEE IS ALSO RECOMMENDED BY SECRETARY OF STATE—WOULD HELP FARMER MATERIALLY.

Announcement was made by Secretary of State Frank D. Fitzgerald Monday that use of 1932 license plates will be legal in Michigan until March 1. At the same time he advocated a reduction in automobile and truck license fees in future years...

"Weight tax revenue is needed badly by the state but the financial condition of the vast majority of Michigan citizens demands that they be given every possible extension of time," Mr. Fitzgerald said.

"Citizens have shown that they cannot afford to purchase plates under the present cost system, but they can pay the gasoline tax," he said.

"I believe plans should be made looking toward a drastic reduction of automobile license plates in the future. Pleasure car plates certainly should be reduced and there is every justification for reduction of costs of license plates for trucks that are not engaged in commercial business, but are used in an incidental manner in connection with another business."

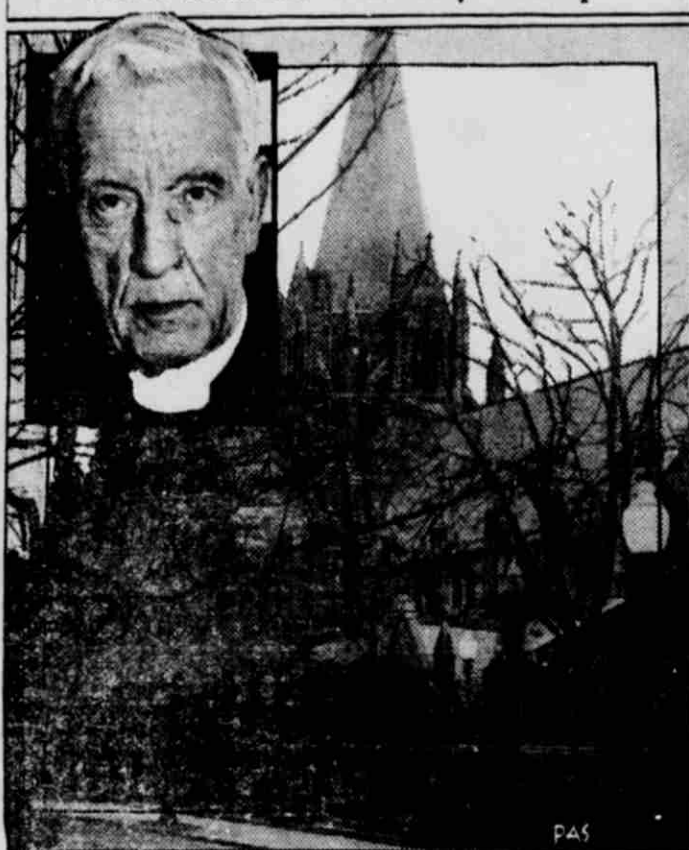

If these job seekers cannot get to the governor in his office, they catch him in the corridors of the capitol or while he is on the way to his hotel room. Even his hotel has become the mecca for both men and women seeking a place on the state payroll. But the governor is not the only one bothered by these job seekers. Newly elected members of the legislature, if they happen to be Democrats, are besieged with requests to arrange interviews with the officials who have power to give jobs. So insistent is the demand for jobs and so much time is taken up by job seekers that the governor nor the state legislature have had much time to give thought to anything else. These are the days that Republican members of the legislature are elated to think they have no spoils to give and no jobs to recommend. They are free to give their entire thought and time to the important and pressing demands of the state.

PROSPERITY AT CHASKA

FROM Frank Parker Stockbridge whose writings appear at intervals in The Ledger, comes the following: "My friend, James F. Faber, city editor of the Valley Herald, published at Chaska, Minnesota, sends me a memorandum of the claim of that thriving little city to the title of 'the most prosperous town in America.' "With 2,000 inhabitants Chaska has a surplus of over \$88,000 in the city treasury. Taxes have been cut 30 per cent. The people of Chaska have almost \$2,500,000 in the two banks, and the town never had a bank failure. There are no natives on the poor list, and the city is providing a good living for nearly ninety business and professional men besides their employees. On top of that Chaska has had new businesses opening in each year of the depression, and has only five names on the delinquent tax list. "I know of no other town the size of Chaska that can make such a showing. Do you?"
