Lowell, Bowne and Vergennes Roll Up Republican Majorities

Ada Township Goes Democratic

Republicans of Lowell Township rolled up an old-time majority in Monday's election. Nearly 1,000 votes were cast, but at that nearly 700 voters remained away from the polls.

Grattan Township

Lee Jakeway was re-elected supervisor of Grattan, being the only Republican to survive the Democratic landslide.

Bowne Township

Bowne stayed in the dry column by a majority of 46 and in the Republican column by majorities ranging from about 150 on the slate ticket to over 200 on the township ticket.

Vergennes Township

Percy J. Read led the Republican ticket in Vergennes by a majority of 207 for constable. The following Democrats were elected: Wm. Daniels, Wm. Murray, Ralph Walton, Ford Wingeier.

Cascade Township

Cascade township gave the Republican state ticket average majorities of 50 or more for each office. The wets polled 152 votes, the dries 97.

Boston Township

The Republican ticket was elected as follows: Supervisor—Carl Lowrey. Clerk—Dorothy Gamsby. Treasurer—Harry Dodds.

Keene Township

Results were mixed, as follows: Supervisor—L. M. Cahoon, D. Clerk—Ray Hoskin, D.

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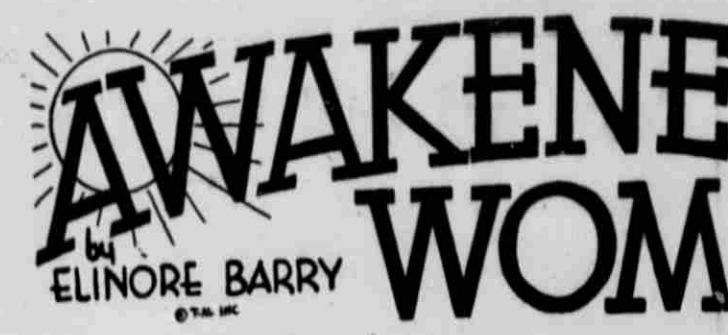
