Michigan State college Saturday observed its seventy-sixth birthday anniversary. Years after the great battle between the Ottawas and the Pottowatomies, Daniel Marsac came into the Grand River valley. He located just south of the Ottawa Village on the east side of the Quabaquina Seabe (Flat River) and began to trade with the Indians. As time went on more white men came into the beautiful valley and settled there. The little place of Fallsburg was settled by a family or families who gave it its name, Lowell as a community had not as yet been organized, although there were quite a few houses in the settlement.

Now, during the cleaning up of the river bank in exactly the same location, Mr. Ashley and his helpers, have made a startling discovery. Hooking on to an old root at the water's edge with a tractor they pulled out not a stump, but a large tree that was completely buried on the river bottom. It had undoubtedly lain there for many years. They hauled it out on the bank and the next day they decided to saw it up for wood, and in sawing found a musket ball imbedded in the tree. Musket and shot are without a question of the same period and who can deny that the bullet came from the old musket found on the river bottom. What strange tricks are played by fate? What strange coincidence stir our imaginations? And the pot of gold? Truth is often much stranger than fiction!

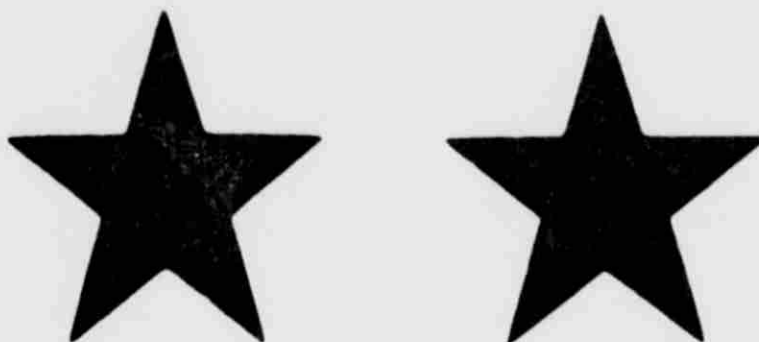

International Tariff Trust Sees Assured—Progress Toward War Debt Settlement—Senate Passes Bill for Control of Securities.

ONE of the busiest men in the world these days is Norman H. Davis, American ambassador large in Europe, and it would be hard to find a more important man in the world.

THE Wheeler resolution, urging the American delegates to the world economic conference to work for an agreement to renounce interest at 10 to 15 with gold, was approved by the committee.

THE international wheat conference opened in Geneva and the American delegation was on hand, its members including Henry Morgenthau, Jr., George C. Hays, member of the federal farm board, and Frederick E. Murphy, publisher of the Minneapolis Tribune.

THE Simpson price-fixing amendment to the farm bill was rejected by the House by a decisive vote—283 to 100—because Chairman Clegg of the agriculture committee urged the House to stand by the administration.

THE Senate agreed to the report on the measure by the conference committee to the farm bill, which was approved by the Senate.

THE United States, he said, had no agreed and no announced intention to take in Washington to that effect.

THE President Roosevelt presumably agrees with MacDonald concerning the necessity of settling the war debts. He sent to congress a message asking that he be given authority to deal with the other nations in settling the debt issue.
