Second Article by Vernon J. Brown Deals With Small Loan and Chain Store Bills—People are Paying for Propaganda Machinery.

Contrary to the usual custom of just a few of the faithful gathering for the final and formal adjournment, there developed a real session of the legislature on July 17, in an effort to override some of the vetoes which the governor has exercised.

ent rate is three and one-half per cent per month. The bill as passed calls for a legal rate of 21 per cent per year. It is supposed to be one of the most active and pernicious lobbies ever operating in Lansing. The government has vetoed the bill with the explanation that the small loan concerns cannot operate at 21 per cent a year. Veteran Driver Gives Timely Tips

Goodyear Test Car Pilo Shows Twelve Ways to Avoid Trouble
With the arrival of vacation season, the curve of automobile travel and gasoline consumption has started a steady climb. More drivers will be on the road and there are likely to be more traffic accidents but motorists can escape many mishaps if they follow the suggestions of J. H. Many accidents also result from drivers not getting enough rest and falling asleep at the steering wheel," he concluded.

Based on his years of experience, Greenleaf has formulated the following "rules for driving" which he follows religiously and which he recommends to motorists everywhere:

- 1—Have good brakes at all times.
- 2—Signal intention of making a turn 100 feet before making.
- 3—Never pass a car on a curve or near the top of a hill.
- 4—Stay on inside of center line on curves and hills.
- 5—Be alert at intersections. Slow up even if you have the right of way.
- 6—When approaching car has blinding lights, slow up and hug your side of road.
- 7—Allow yourself freedom of movement. It is taking a chance to drive with four in the front seat.
- 8—See that your tires have treads that will grip the road should you have to stop quickly or drive on wet, slippery pavements.
- 9—Never jam on brakes as one may lock and cause your car to turn over.
- 10—Get a good sleep before starting on a long drive. If you get "dopey" or sleepy while driving, stop and rest, if only for 15 minutes.
- 11—Always give the other fellow the benefit of the doubt.
- 12—To make good time drive steadily and not too fast.
