## Odds and Ends Here and There

The farm population of the Country, largely dependent on prices that cannot be foreseen at the time of planting, received about \$388,000,000 in cash for farm products during June, a 37 per cent improvement over June of last year, according to current estimates.

Remittance of highway funds owing to the county of Kent was forwarded Monday to the county treasurer from the State Highway Department in the amount of \$12,473.57. This remittance covers the amount due to the county as a refund under the McNitt Act, and represents the third quarter of the total amount due to the county, under this Act, for the year 1933. At the same time remittances have been made to county treasurers on sums owing for maintenance work on the state highway system. The amount remittance due Kent county is \$3,949.32. Added to this, is the sum of \$122.31, which has been owing under miscellaneous account.

The work was supervised by County Engineer Allen M. Williams and Scout Master Roy Carpenter, with the road commission furnishing the material for the dam and the Scouts doing all the work.

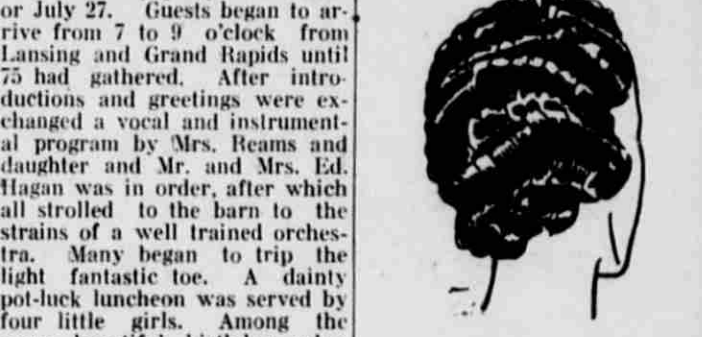

## New Law Curbs Careless Drivers

Michigan's new motor vehicle operators' "financial responsibility" law is not a compulsory insurance law but is intended to restrain careless, irresponsible drivers who have no regard for the safety of other highway users.

Upon receipt of certification that a judgment of \$300 or more has not been satisfied, the Secretary of State, under the law, is required to suspend the operator's license and use of license plates. These can only be reinstated by furnishing proof that the judgment has been met and by establishing future financial responsibility up to \$10,000 in case of two deaths from traffic accidents and \$1,000 responsibility for property damage. This responsibility can be established in four ways—by depositing \$10,000 with the state treasurer; by adequate motor liability insurance; by surety bond; or by a personal bond with two sureties who each own sufficient Michigan property to meet the bond.
