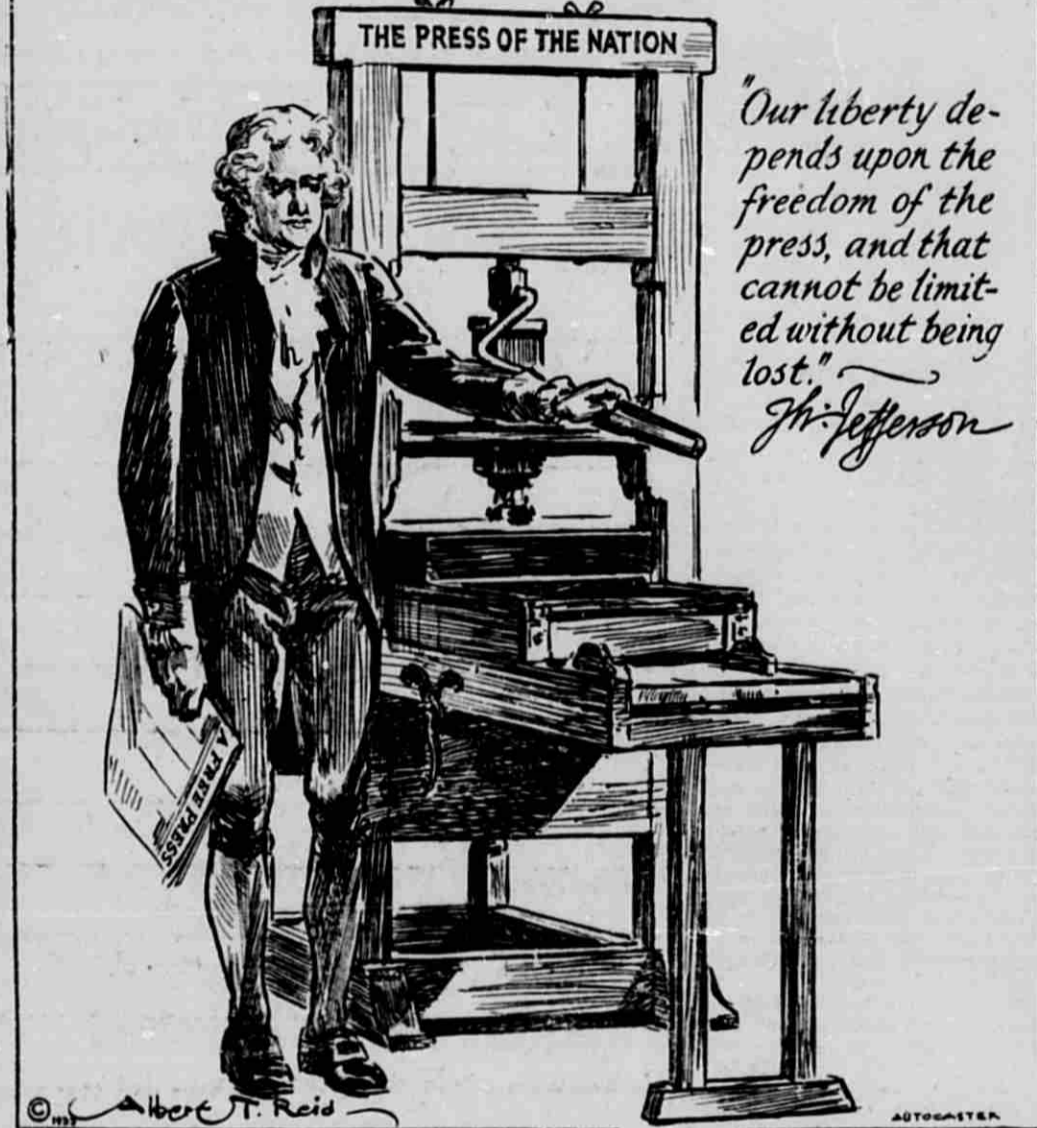

SMOKING MOTHERS AND MOTHERHOOD

The present administration is not unduly concerned about the promise of reducing taxes. But with a new head tax of \$2.00 upon each inhabitant for old age pension, a proposed tax of three per cent and a sales tax of one per cent, which the government has now before water, can you wonder why the highest cost per inhabitant of any state in the Union—Michigan's Banner.
