Washington officials on Saturday estimated that one million men had already been transferred from relief rolls to pay rolls under the newly-started Civil Works program. A total of 70,000 men in Michigan had been given work. The number is increasing daily.

Fines of \$50 and costs of 60 days in jail were assessed against Howard Garter and Rudolph Gross who shot two cock pheasants and a hen pheasant in Tyrone-tp. Their shot guns and hunting licenses were also confiscated.

Thousands of deer hunters are turning homeward, bringing with them the trophies acquired in the north woods, which, besides deer, included bears, coyotes, wolves and foxes. Straits of Mackinac ferries carried most of the homeward parties. It was reported at the Straits that thus far 2,785 deer carcasses have been brought out of the Upper Peninsula.

Alpine fractional district school No. 7 has been closed until a week from next Wednesday because of the development of four cases of scarlet fever there. Dr. J. D. Brook, county health officer, said Saturday. Notices were posted in the district Saturday warning children of the school not to attend any gathering of any kind in Kent county for the period of the closing.

Prout, 73, Michigan reformatory ward guard, who died from a heart attack Wednesday afternoon of last week, while on duty, was buried Saturday morning in Saranac cemetery, following a service at the home in Ionia. Interment was under Masonic auspices. Mr. Prout was a past master and life member of Luther lodge.

Lyburner discovered that while an eighth grade education was the average for this group, 163 families believed that their children should have at least a high school education, and 80 would send their boys and girls to college if they had the means.
