



Encouraging game birds and antmals will help solve the land-use problems of farmers who have taken areas of wheat, corn, and other crops out of production, advises the bureau of biological survey. Game, the bureau points out, has value as a source of recreation and food for the landowner and as an attraction to hunters who will pay for shooting privileges or will reimburse the farmer in other Game as a replacement crop will

\$2.00 Head Tax

Act No. 237 of the Public Acts of 1933 calls for the registration of every resident of the State of Michigan over the age of twenty-

ALSO the law is hereby quoted: "All persons residing in this state of twenty-one years of age and upwards . . . shall pay an annual tax of two dollars . . . Any person failing to pay this tax . . . on or before March first of any year, shall be guilty of a misdementer."

This tax is now due and payable at your township, city, or county treasurer's office. For




