Both meant that one can only live life to the fullest if he does with all his might whatever it is he wishes to do, without thinking about money or possible consequences to himself.

There is nothing to life but living it. Nobody can win the game with death. The thing to do, it seems to us, is to play the game for the sake of the game, and not with the false idea of winning.
