Best for Farm Reservoir A satisfactory material for farm reservoirs is a sandy or gravelly clay that can be packed almost watertight, says the bureau of agricultural engineering, United States Department of Agriculture. If the bed of the reservoir is naturally of such material, and if the water is not to be used for domestic purposes, the bottom can be packed by bedding or feeding sheep on the site when the earth is wet. If the soil is not clayed it is sometimes practical to spread a three or four-inch layer of clay over the bottom and sides of the reservoir and mix it with the surface soil by disking or harrowing. The bed should then be packed by rolling or by the

When the water of a small reservoir is for domestic purposes, ordinary concrete makes a satisfactory lining. If the lining is not re-inforced, it should be from two to four inches thick, and should be placed in blocks or squares of 15 to 20 feet with expansion joints to pre-


