MICHIGAN LIVESTOCK WILL GO HUNGRY NEXT WINTER UNLESS NUMBERS ARE RE-

Prospects of a very pronounced shortage of forage for Michigan livestock next winter are pointed out by the Michigan State College, and State Livestock owners are advised to cull their herds in preparation for this unavoidable condition.

preparation for this unavoidable condition.

Rains between now and winter will furnish little relief. Other sections of the nation have no surplus hay to sell and many states are in desperate straits. Michigan livestock owners will have to adjust flocks and herds to the supplies of forage available. Dr. William Haber, state relief administrator, says that he has no authority to expend relief funds now or next winter to purchase hay for livestock even if such forage could be found. Last year, Dr.Haberspent nearly \$200,000 for hay for Michigan live stock. This amount was paid out in a year when hay was comparatively cheap and when most sections had no forage shortage.

Disposing of surplus beef stock and sheep will involve market complications similar to those encountered by dairymen. Early selection of surplus stock will permit their owner to choose time of marketing better than if the decision to sell is postponed until winter. Beef cattle usually lose weight in periods of dry pasture and when flies disturb the animals the most. This often occurs in August in Michigan.

Many Michigan farmers, themselves or in cooperation with neighbors, can realize more profit from butchering surplus stock and preserving the meat for home and preserving the meat to ribine use than by selling the animals alive on the open ma.ket. Chemist's Hobby Brings New Means Of Extracting Vitamin in Quantity

Twenty years ago, while working | Williams is now able to extract five as a chemist in the government laboratories in the Philippines, Robert R. Williams helped to secure the evidence that some unknown chemical, present in infinitesimal quantities in rice bran, cured beriberi. This is a disease long known to affect oriental races and other people who live largely on polished rice. Unpolished rice, with part of the original bran still clinging to the grain and eaten with it, does not

cause beri-beri. Vitamin From Rice Bran Wish crude substances separated

by chemical means from rice polish, Mr. Williams successfully treated many cases of the disease. Later this chemical was given the name "vitamin." A large family of vitamins has since come to be recognized by scientists.

Mr. Williams returned to the War joined the staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories. Here he presently took charge of important chemical researches for the telephone industry, and has been for some years director of chemical research in those laboratories. Made Research His Hobby

But his interest in the mysterious vitamin of rice bran continued. The tiny particles of this have some powerful attraction for the molecules of the vitamin, which promptly leave the solution and stick to the particles of powder.

The next problem is to get these vitamin molecules loose again. Out United States, and at the end of the of hundreds of ways which have been tried to loosen the vitamin, the most successful one so far discovered is to do it with ordinary quinine. Quinine sulphate is added to a watery mixture of vitaminized fuller's earth. For some reason which is another mystery, the molecules of quinine displace the vitamin molecules, so that the vitamin is left free in the solution, from which it can be concentrated and crystalized.
