Cash Now Becomes Available to Depositors of the Old Institutions at the New Bank as it Swings Open its Doors

The Lowell State Bank and the City State Bank Pass from the Picture With Advent of New Institution

Deposits in New Bank Protected by Government IN YEAR 1935 Insurance up to \$5,000.00

The State Savings Bank, Lowell, Michigan, will open its doors for business next Monday, August 20. The opening of the new bank became an assured fact upon receipt of word last Saturday from the Federal Reserve headquarters in Chicago to the effect that license to do business had been granted the new

The new bank will have a capital of \$50,000, which is nearly double that of its two predecessors combined.

When the State Savings Bank opens its doors on next Monday morning it will be in a highly liquid position. Some money will, of course, be withdrawn during the first few days after opening, mainly for the purpose of meeting obligations long past due, and most of this money so withdrawn will naturally soon find its way back into the new institution.

Under the new setup for the operation of banks, greater restrictions are imposed than ever before and, in addition, the accounts of depositors are fully insured with the government up to the amount of \$5,000. The insurance provision is a positive guarantee of safety to depositors and is one of the prime reasons for the confidence with which patrons are welcoming the return of banking facilities.

The news that normal banking facilities are to be returned to Lowell will be received with rejoicing by all the citizens of the village and the surrounding territory.

The new Lowell bank reopens under what has been termed "The 54 Bank Plan" and is the twenty-first institution in the state to be opened thus far under this plan, leaving some thirty-odd banks yet to be opened by this method.

In addition to the cash which will be available on and after next Monday, depositors of the Lowell State Bank and of the City State Bank will also receive certificates of indebtedness against their impounded balances.
