His time from coast to coast was 11 hours, 59 minutes. The best time made by Rickenbacker was 12 hours, 3 minutes, 50 seconds. Breakfast at the Golden Gate and evening dinner under the gleam of light from the statue of liberty in New York harbor will soon become an every-day affair.
