Michigan ranks third among the states of the Union in the amount of land under state forest man-

More than a quarter million pounds of noxious fish were re-moved from game-fishing waters within Michigan's jurisdiction during 1934.

An increase of 45 per cent in the number of women reached by home economics extension work during 1934 over the previous year has been announced by Miss Edna V. Smith, state leader of home demonstration agents, Mich-igan State College.

Hiawatha is the Iroquois name of a hero, of miraculous birth, who came to the North American Indians, to bring them peace and goodwill, observes a writer in the Cleveland Plain Dealer.

In Longfellow's poem, published in 1855, he was a member of the Ojibway tribe, reared by his grandmother, Nokomis, daughter of the

Hiawatha represents the progress of civilization among the Indians, First he wrestled with Mondamin (Indian maize), whom he subdued and gave to man bread-corn. He then taught man navigation; then he subdued the Mishe-Nahma or sturgeon, and told the people to "bring all their pots and kettles and make oil for the winter."

Hiawatha then conquered Megis sogwon, the magician, "who sent the flery fever on man; sent the white fog from the fen-lands; sent disease and death among us" and he taught his people the science of medicine. Then he married "Laughing Water," setting his adherents an example to follow. Lastly, he

taught them picture writing. With the arrival of the white men and their religious faith, Hiawatha asked his people to receive the new words of wisdom and departed "to the kingdom of Ponemah, the land of the Hereafter."




