Additional Entries SAINT PATRICK MARCH 17 has long been celebrated by the sons of Old Erin as Saint Patrick's day. This famous old character is noted for countless traditions of his remarkable achievements. He is far back in ancient days, when the facts were somewhat uncertain. It is regrettable that we do not know more accurately the story of this famous man, who was evidently one of the greatest personalities of that remote age. The old saying has it that he found no Christmas in Ireland, and left it without any mark. He must have had a tremendously persuasive power, to thus change the faith of a nation. It is maintained that he was born in the year 380, that he was captured in some of the ways of the time, and carried to Ireland, where he became a priest for some years. Apparently he formed a deep conviction of the life of Jesus, and later was impelled by spiritual visions to preach the gospel in that country. He appears to have led a life of fervent religiousness, and his sermons, which so inspired his words and deeds that the people of the Emerald Isle were converted to his belief. It is doubtful if history contains any other parallel instance of the ability of one man to convert the eloquence of his preaching and the force of his personality, to convert a whole nation to a spiritual creed. The Irish have always had a gift for genial good nature, which wins friends for them, and makes them a power in the world. St. Patrick probably shared that quality, which helped him win souls for his cause. The Irish probably felt that a religion that would produce such an attractive character was good enough for them.

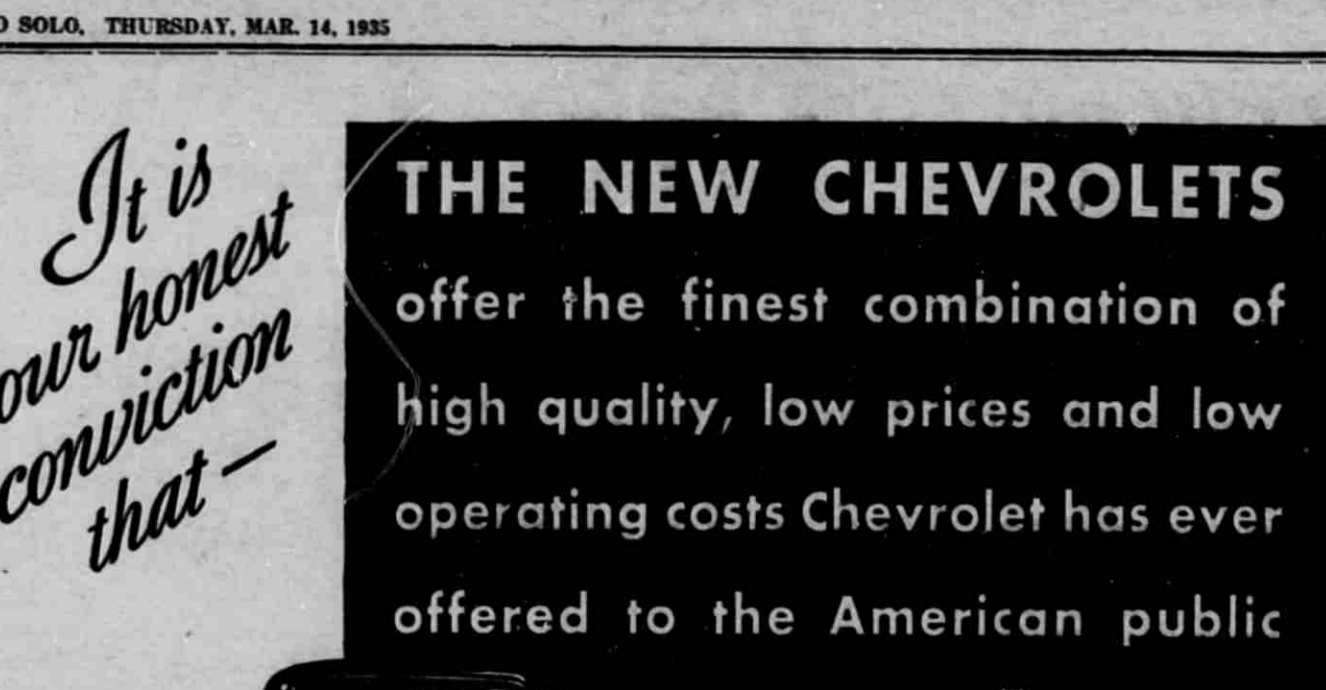
