



Odds and Ends

Reduction of the number of families on the relief rolls of Kent county, first recorded last December, has continued through the first two weeks of this month. The report shows that 137 fam-ilies or 631 individuals have been The report shows that 137 talkillies or 631 individuals have been able to leave the rolls since April 1. Since January 1 there have been 1,538 families or 7,178 persons taken from the rolls because of other sources of livelihood. These include many families in the royal areas, who have left the rural areas who have left the rolls because they have succeed-ed in obtaining farm work. The others able to leave the rolls have benefitted by the definite in-dustrial upturn.

Crabs "Shed" Quickly

The transition of crabs through he three stages from peeler through soft shell to hard shell is only a matter of a very few hours under natural conditions. hardshell crab, having outgrown/its shell and with a new or soft shell developed beneath, gradually breaks out of the hard shell. Dur ing that stage it is known as a peeler. Once out of the shell the new shell is soft and will remain so if the crab is taken out of the water and packed for shipment to market. 

Voted on Slavery


