## Well Bids Fair To Yield Results

## Of Hard Shale, 2170 - ft. Down

A current of suppressed excitement has been surging throughout this entire community for the past several days over favorable indications of ultimately striking oil on the Anton Kallinger farm, where drilling operations have been in progress for two months past.

This feeling of excitement began to grow last Sunday when traces of oil began to appear in the upper traverse at a depth of 2,165 feet. Operations were then temporarily suspended in order to determine the next step to be taken. The local promoters, C. H. Runciman, W. V. Burras, H. J. Englehardt and Earl Thomas, together with Edward Duvall, who is in charge of the drilling operations, held a meeting and, after consulting with experts from the Dow Chemical Company of Midland, decided to try acids which are used for enlarging the underground passages. The results of this experiment were not quite satisfactory and drilling was again resumed on Wednesday afternoon.

This (Thursday) morning the drillers are at a depth of 2,170 feet, pounding away in an iron-like shale which forms a dome in the upper traverse strata. How long it will take to get through this dome no one knows. It may be a matter only of hours or days of time may be required. Underneath this dome the drillers will strike one of three things-gas, oil or salt


